Year 7 with Dr. Enoma



It has been an exceedingly productive semester in the Year 7 English lessons. The students have participated actively in a wide range of activities including writing a report on their favourite animals, writing an essay on the most memorable toy or gift they received as a child and learning new words and their opposites. They received one-on-one literacy intervention twice weekly under our MultiLit (Making Up Lost Time In Literacy) program to acquire the skills they need to become functional readers. This consisted of each student, working individually with a staff member on their phonics and phonemes (Word Attack) to develop the skills of decoding, sight words to enrich their vocabulary and reading a wide range of texts (you learn to read by reading). Daily, the Year 7 students participated in guided reading and reading comprehension sessions to improve their speaking and listening skills.

It has been just as busy with regard to the Mathematics learning area. *Students were provided in-class and authentic learning experiences to help build their knowledge and understanding in mathematics and particularly in content areas related to Number and Algebra as well as Measurement and Geometry.* Students went on a weekly excursion to Coles during term 2 to bring alive to them the importance of the skills they have been practising in class, and to provide them with the opportunities to practise these skills in a real-life situation. This approach has proven to be particularly effective in teaching money mathematics to students.

At Halls Head College ESC, we recognise that developing students' capacity to get along with each other, making lasting friendships, taking responsibility for one's actions and learning how to repair broken relationships are essential to their success in adulthood, health and wellbeing. *Students had many opportunities this semester to work towards these goals and it has been very heart-warming to see the improved confidence and remarkable progress that have been made in our Year 7's Social Skills.*

In Mathematics this term, our focus has been on number, measurement and money. ***The students have also had the opportunity to use an online program called Skoolbo in addition to their set work.***

Students have been very creative during English classes. They used their imagination to write a multitude of stories and non-fiction pieces. This involved the use of story cubes, brain storming, story boarding and drafting.

Science this term has been a lot of fun, with students learning about chemicals. ***The students have enjoyed wearing all their Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), measuring and mixing all the ingredients and seeing the different results.*** They had fun making slime, a lava lamp and volcanoes.



At the end of term 1, as a reward for all their hard work, the Year 8's enjoyed a team building day at Doddi's beach. We have had a fun filled term in room 1.5!

In English we have been reading Frankie Fish, in Mathematics we have continued learning our times tables and focused on angles plus in Science we have been learning about Biology!

In particular, one of our key highlights this term was our excursion with Year 8.1 to The Nostalgia Box in Perth! As part of our Humanities and Social Studies (HASS) program, students were given the opportunity to engage in the history of technology processes and how it influenced everyday lives. Catching the train up to the city to visit The Nostalgia Box was an interactive, fun and educational school excursion experience for all students. They learnt the history of video games and changes in technology in an engaging way, displayed responsible behaviour in the community and participated in activities that developed their social skills of getting along, organisation, persistence, resilience and confidence. All students are to be commended for their excellent behaviour and should be proud of representing Halls Head ESC so positively to the wider community!

Our second highlight of the term was our Hula Hoop Incursion! SYL Sport and Wellness delivered a ***specialised Hula Hooping activity fun day*** where students learnt tricks, skills and exercises with a world record holding internationally accredited professional Hula Hoop Instructor!

This experience gave students an opportunity to improve their strength, coordination, flexibility and endurance and also provided them with a fun experience to gain confidence within themselves. Year 9.1 with Mrs Enoma




The Year 9 Mathematics lessons for the second half of this semester focused on enhancing students' understanding of measurement and number skills. The students participated in a number of activities involving the measurements of various shapes and objects and calculating their perimeters. They also learned about financial literacy such as adding up the prices of items on a shopping list and calculating change. In order to enhance their money skills, ***Ms Sharon Hooper from Mandurah Bendigo Community Bank visited our school to talk to students about various aspects of responsible spending and money handling.***



For the last few weeks of this term, our students have focused on spelling, phonics, reading comprehension and creative writing. The students displayed their literacy competence in a variety of ways including: engaging in reading comprehension activities weekly at the school library, participating in persuasive writing (E.g. 'Recycling – It's Not Easy Being Green') which they shared with the rest of the class.



During Science students have investigated the different scientific concepts under the 'Chemical Sciences' strand. In one of our investigations, students were given various household substances (E.g. coca-cola, coffee, orange juice, cleaning products, etc.) to test their pH to decide whether they are acidic or alkaline. The students also measured the pH levels of drinking water collected from various sources (e.g. tap water, rain water, filtered tap water and water from the shops). Some of the water tested was found to be above the recommended pH levels for drinking water.

Our class has had such a wonderful term working on many projects and activities. We pride ourselves in working together as a team and building friendship within our classroom and our school.

Graham has been cooking up a storm for his Project Base Learning by creating some Minion cupcake master pieces. All his fellow classmates were so happy with the delicious outcome.



In HASS the students' have been learning the history of the ANZAC's and to commemorate the soldiers of Gallipoli by baking some ANZAC biscuits. ANZAC biscuits were sent by the wives and women groups to the soldiers during the war.

Every Thursday during periods 3 and 4 our class separates into different Health and Wellbeing groups throughout the school. Health and Wellbeing sessions are a holistic approach for the students to learn different skills and abilities while focusing on their mental and physical health. The students have so much fun in an array of different activities.

Year 10 with Mrs Hodge

In English this term, in line with identifying career options and building skills, students have continued to extend on their resumes. They explored job advertising and how to apply for and complete a job application. Students had the opportunity to attend the Halls Head College Destination Expo where they were exposed to information about training pathways, including TAFE and University.

Practicing number recognition and demonstrating an understanding of basic conventions of Mathematics has kept the Year 10's busy this term. ***A representative from Bendigo Bank presented an information session to the students, extending their knowledge on banking and safe money practices*** which linked in nicely with our current studies in concepts of work, income, banking and taxation. Students will increase their knowledge when an Education Officer from the Australian Tax Department visits the school next term. Students have also started to learn the basic concepts of budgeting and purchasing items of need, and have followed this up by practising their skills with a visit to the supermarket.

This term has been very productive for ***our Business Enterprise students who prepared and conducted their very first stall for Mother's Day which was a huge success.*** A selection of items were made throughout the term in anticipation for the big day. Students were very happy with their first attempt and are now preparing for Father's Day with new items. They are also developing core work skills as they participate in the Coffee Steam enterprise. A selection of interested students have created order forms, taken orders, made coffee and then delivered the orders. They have also counted money and performed basic stock takes.

This term, students have revised their knowledge and shared their understanding of the Keys to Success Programme and Zones of Regulation, identifying each of the 5 keys, the values that are associated with them and explored thought blockers and positive self-talk. Each week, students set realistic goals that they will practice and work towards achieving throughout the week. During Social Skills, students have also engaged in a combination of cooking and garden activities, each week alternating and sharing the load. They have worked on the basic etiquette of meal preparation and meal time manners.

During Semester 2 Year 10 students will participate in the Keys for Life pre-driver education course. They will learn the core skills of road awareness and safety as drivers, passengers and pedestrians. Mandurah Shire are conducting the RYDE program that will aim to compliment the Keys for Life program and support young drivers.



WorkPlace Learning

Year 10 students commenced their WorkPlace Learning out in the community, with various employers supporting this program. *They have been given reviews from each of their supervisors and it is pleasing to read such wonderful feedback, well done Year 10's.* Students will continue their placements until week 10 of term 3.

A few tips and reminders to students and parents:

- ◊ It is very important that students bring their logbook back to school every week so if parents/guardians can help with this it will be greatly appreciated.
- ◊ If a student is having difficulties or issues with their placement then it is vital that they discuss this with the WPL staff, Candyce Doorn and Georgina Fay.
- ◊ Mobile phones are to be turned off and left in bags whilst at your Work Placement.
- ◊ When late or not attending please ensure a phone call is made to **both** the school (9581 0613) and the Work Place (WPL supervisor's name and contact details are in the student logbook).
- ◊ Logbooks need to be filled in each day by the students and returned to school the next day.
- ◊ Ensure students have had a suitable amount of sleep the night before.

We wish our Year 10's all the very best with the remainder of their Work Placements and we look forward to hearing more stories of success.

Being a helpful bystander against cyberbullying

Bullying used to be something you could see or hear: face-to-face physical and verbal behaviour in the playground, classroom and on the way to and from school. Now, online technology and constant connectivity means children can be bullied through often anonymous contact or actions, anytime, anywhere, and often out of sight of adult eyes.

Cyberbullying commonly occurs through:

- Comments posted in an open online environment, for example on social media sites, and
- Direct text, email or instant messages online or on a mobile phone.
- Private features on a social networking services such as Snapchat and Facebook Messenger.

Friends and family can play an important role in helping reduce the spread and impact of cyberbullying because perpetrators may back down when they see that their target has support. Here are some simple steps you can encourage your child to take if they see or know that a friend is being cyberbullied.

- Don't forward messages or pictures. Though they may not have started it, they will become a part of the cyberbullying cycle.
- Stand up and speak out against cyberbullying. If your child is confident, encourage them to tell the perpetrator that their comments or actions are hurtful and that they should stop.
- Talk to someone they trust like parents or a teacher.
- Support your child's friends by reporting the cyberbullying. Most websites have online safety centres and reporting facilities, and online abuse is in violation of the Terms of Use of most social networking sites.

The Office of the Children's eSafety Commission can take complaints and provide assistance in relation to serious cyberbullying material that is directed at a particular child with the intention to seriously embarrass, harass, threaten or humiliate.
