This semester, the Year 7 students have been working on a number of skill areas under the *Number and Algebra* and *Statistics and Probability* strands. During the first part of this semester (Term Three), students have consolidated and expanded on their knowledge of the four mathematical operations and focused on the subtraction and addition of numbers at various levels. For the latter, it has been an expectation that students would be able to transfer their earlier experience with the addition of numbers into doing money maths in authentic learning situations such as shopping. It is hoped that such an intersection of learning opportunities between classroom work and real life situations will enable students to gain a holistic understanding of mathematical operations.

Students have worked hard on different areas of literacy this semester (including participation in MultiLit activities) in response to their individual learning needs. However, the majority of students have worked on some of the parts of speech including nouns, pronouns, and verbs. They have learned about the capitalization rule that is applicable to proper nouns and have displayed consistent confidence in categorizing nouns into "Persons", "Place" and "Things". Students have found pronouns specificity in relation to gender, object and its plurality to be challenging but are making progress

In Science, this term, students have learnt about the concept of "friction" as the 'resistance encountered by two surfaces or objects rubbing against each other or moving over each other'. Currently, the Year 7 students are undertaking an investigation on the frictional forces displayed by surfaces of different textures. Students have also explored the different types of friction including static friction and kinetic friction.









# Year 8.1

## with Mr Barker

In English this term, the Year 8 students have learnt about Shakespeare in conjunction with Literacy and Numeracy week. They read and watched famous modern day adaptations of Shakespearean plays and then thoroughly enjoyed role-playing some of the plays. Plays which the class focused on were Hamlet, Romeo and Juliet, Antony and Cleopatra, The Twelfth Knight and Macbeth.





During Maths, students continued to work on chance and probability as well as making a start on statistics. They created graphs that organised data and learnt to read coordinates. On top of this, students continued working to their Maths levels on various online programs such as Skoolbo.

In Humanities, the class has looked into Aboriginal history and culture, learning mainly about the Dreamtime. This will culminate in a whole school Aboriginal cultural walk in Erskine.

In Science, our class carried out various experiments, including creating a rainbow liquid bottle. After completing these experiments, students wrote down the materials used and the procedures followed. They also included a photo of themselves conducting the experiments. The Year 8s were also lucky enough to go to SciTech, where they were able to participate in activities that allowed them to discover many wonderful things about science.





# Class 8.2 have had a fun and exciting term.

Students visited the Halls Head Shopping Centre where they had the opportunity to work on their Literacy, Numeracy and Social Skills. The class will have a chance to cook with the items they purchased from Coles.

Book week was a highlight for our class this term with our theme being "Harry Potter". All our students enjoyed both dressing up and taking part in all the activities throughout the day. The students proudly showed off their classroom to their peers, who were invited inside to do a few special activities. Students showed the other classes how to write with invisible ink and then reveal a secret message.

Year 8.2

In week 7, the Year 8's caught the train to City West and Scitech. Students entered the planetarium where they were able to experience the night sky and enjoyed trying to find the stars that they see regularly. It is quite an amazing sensory experience and sitting inside the dome makes the show feel very real.





# Year 9.1 with Mrs Enoma

The Year 9 students have been learning about division, multiplication, and the place value of numbers during our Mathematics lessons this term. They have also studied various topics under the *Statistics and Probability* strand. These include learning how to conduct chance experiments, administering surveys to collect data from staff and students (e.g. favourite soft drinks and takeaway food) and summarizing the information gathered into appropriate graphs.







As part of their English program this term, students have been busy engaging with recount writing, reading comprehension, sight words and homophones. Additionally, they are having regular opportunities to expand their vocabulary to boost individual student's confidence in the skill of public speaking.

In **Science**, students have learnt about the concepts of 'light' and 'shadow'. Under both topics, they have enjoyed investigating various materials that are transparent, translucent and opaque.







The year 9.1 students went on an excursion this term to the Kailis Brothers Fish Market in Leederville as part of our social skills instruction program. Students were given a guided tour of the business and an information session on the business operations, the different types of seafood, how they are caught and handled.

Opportunities were also given to our students to observe the different methods of preparing seafood. They were delighted to have a seafood lunch which provided the students with an authentic learning opportunity to consolidate on the relevant social skills and table manners.



# Year 10 with Mrs Hodge

Throughout the term students have continued with a focus on career development, looking at job advertisements both on the internet and in the local paper. They have then explored the roles of employers they see as potential interest.

Students have also been preparing for their upcoming attendance to the Peter Pan show, as they replicated the characters during the Book Week parade, sticking to the theme of Disney.

In Mathematics this term, representatives from Bendigo Bank and the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) visited to explain how financial systems work. Students engaged in presentations that explained different financial terms used, as well as how the tax system works and what the funding is used for. As a result, students were able understand where the funds come from to maintain our schools, hospitals, roads and parks. Students have continued to practice mathematics skills as they visit the shopping centre, explore time and money, payslips and budgeting.

Once again the Business Enterprise students have worked productively planning and creating beautiful items for the public. On return from holidays, students participated in the Disability Expo where they showcased some of the items they make. Several students supported the stall, greeted and spoke with the public and shared their creations. The Business Enterprise gained a new piece of equipment recently — a Cricut Machine which has enabled students to create vinyl stickers. Students experimented with the machine to make some wonderful Father's Day gifts and will continue to use it in our preparations for Christmas.

During social skills, students continue to identify healthy relationships and resilience to different social situations and events. Students are developing the skills to cope with changes in feelings and emotions, and to help they each made their own DIY stress ball.

### TRANSITION TO SENIOR SCHOOL

Our Year 10 Transition program is well underway with staff from John Tonkin College ESC visiting our class fortnightly to get to know our students.

Students attended JTC ESC on 19th September for their very first day at Senior School.

They had a tour of the school looking at the facilities and programs that are on offer for next year. They joined the staff and students for breakfast club where they enjoyed a spread of delicious food prepared for them. All students were very excited at the options available for next year. Connor stated that he enjoyed seeing his friends from last year.

Students will attend JTC ESC during Term 4, on the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Week 9 (9th, 10th & 11th December). Information regarding this has already been sent home to parents.


# WHAT A GREAT YEAR OF WPL 2019 HAS BEEN.





# Health with Mrs Hardy


During Term three our year nine students are learning to be drug aware and to understand what a drug is. Students are learning that the consequences of drug use depends on the type of drug and the quantity, the person using it and the environment that they are in. They are learning about the impact alcohol can have on people's lives and how making good choices can keep them physically, emotionally, socially and mentally healthy.

Year eight students are increasing their awareness of personal safety at home, at school and in the community. Using iPads to record their ideas, students identified what and who keeps them safe in their home. Students discovered that rules and regulations are made to keep people safe at school and planning ahead when you are going out in the community can help to keep you safe. (see pictures to right)

Year seven students are learning Road Awareness and safety, focusing on bike, pedestrian and passenger safety. Using their iPads, students take responsibility for putting pictures and new information into Book Creator. They created checklists of what they should do before riding a bike, scooter or skateboard and are encouraged to take responsibility for their safety when riding the school bikes, fitting helmets correctly and following road rules. All year seven, eight and nine students are learning skills to assist them develop and maintain good physical, emotional, social and mental health.

## Protecting your child against online identity theft

As your child grows up they develop responsibility to access services such as a library membership, bank accounts and a mobile phone. This includes managing the use of PINS and passwords to ensure that personal information is safe and only revealed to appropriate people and organisations.

Identity theft is when your child's personal information is used without their knowledge or permission. Personal information can be accessed from their online accounts and with sufficient information, criminals can transfer money directly from bank accounts or impersonate your child online on social networking sites. Your child can reduce the chance of identity theft by:

- Using secure websites for shopping and online banking. Look for the padlock symbol, a URL that begins with 'https' and correct spelling and logos.
- Monitor their content. If their profile has been hacked, shut it down immediately. Some sites also allow you to set up notifications when your account is logged in from an unregistered device.
- Changing their passwords regularly. Passwords should never be shared, should be changed frequently and be a mix of letters, numbers and symbols.
- Not getting phished. Ensure your child doesn't respond to calls or emails from 'banks' asking for pin numbers and passwords. If they are concerned it is not the real bank, hang up and call back their publicly listed number. If an email from a bank/credit card asks you to click on a link chances are it's a scam.
- Reporting it. If your child thinks that they have had their personal details stolen or used without their knowledge, they should talk to their bank or other related institution.
