# Year 7 with Dr. Enoma



In English students participated in a wide range of literacy activities this semester.

While some students worked on the same topic but at different levels, others worked on different literacy tasks as dictated by their individual strengths and areas of need.

The focus areas covered in English this semester included reading, spelling, researching and reporting. Others included the provision of one-on-one support through our MultiLit intervention program, learning about some of the parts of speech including nouns, pronouns, verbs, prepositions and conjunctions. While studying the parts of speech, students had many practice sessions on the categorization of nouns, into 'persons', 'places' and 'things'.









As the 2019 school year draws to a close, I wish to acknowledge the industry and resilience of the Year 7 students in making a smooth transition from their primary schools to Halls Head College Education Support Centre. Change is often not easy but you have displayed an extraordinary degree of resilience and flexibility to make settling into your new school a huge success. My sincere thanks also go to my team of staff for their exemplary team play, devotion to work and professionalism.

The skill areas covered in Mathematics in Semester Two were selected from the *Number and Algebra* and *Statistics and Probability* strands. *Considering the importance of money skills in everyday life, the class spent an extended period of time learning about adding Australian money, particularly coins.* A few students who demonstrated competence with adding Australian coins worked on more challenging problems such as adding a combination of notes and coins.

Students also participated in other lessons covering multiplication, division and exploring the relationship between both. Under the *Statistics and Probability* strand, students only covered the fundamentals such as learning to speak in 'statistical language'.

Science has been popular with my students this semester and throughout the school year. Students have enjoyed and appreciated the opportunities to investigate the unknown and to discover outcomes that were not consistent with their predictions. They conducted a number of experiments while learning about friction, and various aspects of inclined plane (Physical Sciences). Students learnt about the Solar System and the uses of soil and water under the Earth and Space strand.

# Year 8.1

# with Mr Barker

In English this term, the students continued to stretch their creative wings through weekly creative writing challenges. These challenges aimed to provide students with a number of strategies they could call upon when needing to come up with original ideas. Some of the strategies taught were one-word stories, story cubes and adaptation.

On top of these creative writing challenges, students were also challenged to plan and teach a lesson of their choice to the class. Some of the lessons that the students taught were basketball drills, healthy eating, baking, drumbeat and bicycle riding. A lot of the students showed they would make great teachers, even I learnt a few new strategies from observing them!



The students participated in many fun maths activities this term. *Finska, an outdoor garden game involving numerical problem solving, was introduced to them.* We have been playing this almost every week due to how engaging it is. Other activities the students enjoyed regularly were Monopoly, Bingo, and Chance a Probability Card Game.

The Year 8s also went on an excursion to Coles where they were put into groups and tasked to find ingredients for a particular dish. This was a positive experience for everyone.

In Humanities, students continued to study Aboriginal Culture, in particular the games that Aboriginal people used to play both for training and recreation.

Traditions and celebrations were also continued to be taught this term, with the students getting involved in Halloween and, as the year wraps up, Christmas and New Year. The students have had fun during these lessons.

As part of Economics, the students participated in a trading game. They had to begin with a small nail and trade it with another class for something worth more. With whatever they got from that class, they would have to then trade that item for an item worth more with a different class. This process would repeat until all the classes in the school had traded with us. From a small nail, the students managed to get a talking cockatoo fridge magnet, a lounge set, a birdcage, a globe and finally a special class lunch.

Science would be the Year 8s favourite lessons this year. All students had the opportunity to conduct fun experiences, including designing and building their own balloon boat. Their favourite experience has to be making slime which they have just about perfected.

It has been a pleasure teaching the Year 8s and I wish them all the best for next year.







This term in HASS students learnt about Australia's Early Settlement by the British in the 17<sup>th</sup> century. The relationship between the two countries has continued to be sustained all these years later, made evident on an excursion to the Perth Bell Tower. We learnt how the official royal bells, were transported to our humble shores from England in exchange for materials plentiful from our land to rebuild a new set.

After practicing a chime or two, staff and students ventured on to the Perth Mint where we learnt about the value of gold in relation to Australian currency, not only verbally from our guide but visually too with a live gold pour!

# Year 9.1 with Mrs Enoma

This term, the Year 9 students have been learning about plotting data on Venn diagrams and using the information gathered from various surveys to make bar graphs. Other areas covered in mathematics this semester include factors and finding the multiples of numbers. Students also engaged in hands-on shopping activities where they added items on shopping lists and calculated the change required.

In English students have been busy this semester exploring a wide range of texts as they developed the relevant skills to becoming intentional, purposeful and active readers. They have worked on employing metacognitive strategies in their reading activities and over time have individually improved on their reading fluency and comprehension. The four reading roles strategies (Freebody & Luke 1990) came in handy for these students as they employed skills relevant to the meaning maker, code breaker, text user and text critic to enhance their comprehension of various texts. Students also had ample opportunities to practise creative writing, punctuation, spelling and participated in phonics activities

Several opportunities have been provided this semester to learn practical life skills. These include the skills needed to perform the activities of daily living. *Under the Social Skills Program, students learnt to be confident and how to adopt a positive mindset as expressed often in their communication such as 'I believe that I will be successful 'and 'I am not afraid to make mistakes'*. The students have also been involved in various life skills activities such as dressing an inflatable bed, using the sewing machine and vacuum cleaner (to clean the classroom). Some students learnt how to iron their clothes and tie their shoe laces.



# Year 9.2 with Mr. Dixon

This term, students focused on creative writing, comprehension, spelling, punctuation and homophones in English.

Everyone used their imagination to write stories that varied from Unicorns that fought Dragons to being sucked in and trapped in a video game. All the stories were entertaining and exciting. There has been a continuation using the EPIC reading app and our class has recently completed reading 150 books which has been a great effort.



In social skills, the students have covered topics such as Anxiety, Procrastinating, Stress Management and Gratitude as part of the You Can Do It program.

We have also cooked up a storm as part of the Independent Living class where the students have made healthy dishes and snacks that are simple to make and delicious.

HASS has seen our students learning about the First Fleet and the role convicts played in establishing Australia as a nation.

There was an excursion to Fremantle Prison which taught us of the harsh conditions faced by the early European settlers and prisoners.




# WorkPlace Learning



# Trolling online - what it is and how to support your child

<u>Trolling</u> is when a user intentionally causes distress, anger and argument in an online public forum for the purpose of disturbing other users.

Individuals who partake in trolling seek an emotional response from others, whether with malicious or humorous intent. Responding to trolling comments can result in the activity escalating.

Your children may experience trolling on social networking sites, online gaming, chat rooms or blogs. Watch the "Chatterbox" episode about trolling, tagging and bagging. (see esafety.gov.au)

Children can protect themselves by taking the following action:

**Ignoring the troll** – responding to nasty, immature and offensive comments only gives trolls the attention they want.

Blocking the troll – taking away their power. If they pop up under a different name block or mute them again.

Reporting trolls – reporting to site administrators. If they pop up under a different name, report them to site administrators again. If you feel your safety is being threatened, contact the police for further advice. You may consider not using the site until the issue is resolved or the troll has become bored.

Talking with friends and family – if a troll has upset your child, it helps to talk about it with friends and family. You or your child can visit esafety.gov.au or call the Kids Helpline on 1800 55 1800 or eheadspace on 1800 650 890.

Protecting friends from trolls – if trolls are upsetting your child's friend tell them to Ignore, Block, Report. Tell their family and other friends and encourage them to seek support.
