YEAR 7.1

Mrs Leah Booher

Term 4 has been a busy time of growth, learning and lots of fun for Year 7.1 class!

They have worked hard in developing a strong routine and becoming independent. This has helped to sustain structure and has encouraged students to '**create their own journey**'. Myself and team members Mrs McColl, Mrs Nyburg, Mrs Turner and Mrs Lawrence, are all extremely proud of the maturity, growth and confidence our year 7.1 students have developed over this last year!



ENGLISH- Typing continued to be a main focus during Term 4. Undertaken three times a week, the class has progressed through the typing program, enhancing and developing their typing skills. This aided students in completing their Asian Country research paper, which was presented to the class through both an oral and visual presentation.

MATHS- Subtraction has been the focus, using the algorithm method strategy to understand the concept of subtraction and place value. This strategy was used in class to create and solve subtraction word and number problems.

SCIENCE- Everyone has had an amazing time learning all about Chemical Science this term, carrying out lots of in-class experiments. We compared the differences between pure substances and mixtures and made a list of examples for each. Students were set the challenge of how they could use separation techniques such as threshing, winnowing, yandying, sieving, trying to replicate these techniques.

Desalination, both thermal and reverse osmosis, was explored in great detail. Students now understand that desalination can be used as a tool to help with the drinking supply in some areas of the world.

HASS- During HASS students learnt about economics, with many discussions taking place around the difference between needs and wants. Our word wall grew very large with new vocabulary such as scarcity, consumer, producers, supply and demand. It was great to listen to the students having discussions around how businesses set a price for a product and how it may increase or decrease according to the demand for that product.

Blue Keys continued to be awarded this term in accordance with the 'You Can Do It' curriculum for Organization, Resilience, Getting Along, Persistence and Confidence. Throughout the week students were rewarded with keys for demonstrating these positive behaviours. At the end of each day a key would be randomly pulled and the winner would get to choose something from the prize box. At the end of the week,

the student who had been awarded the most keys for the week would visit our Principal, Mrs Fieldwick, to choose from a larger prize box. Everyone has responded positively to the You Can Do It, Blue Key Program.



YEAR 7.2

I would like to say a big hello and introduce myself.

My name is Alicia Hart and I am the new Year 7.2 teacher who started at the beginning of this term. Everyone has been so welcoming and supportive and it has been a real pleasure working with such wonderful students in 7.2.

ENGLISH - This term we learnt the difference between fact and fiction and facts and opinions, as well as how to research topics and interests on the internet. Students were given the

task of researching a chosen country in Asia and creating a power-point and booklet to inform the reader about different facts, such as currency, food, housing and flags.



MATHS - Our math focus has been shapes and fractions. We looked at 3D shapes, creating nets of pyramids, cubes, cylinders, spheres and prisms. We then further studied the attributes of these shapes, identifying faces, edges and corners. Everyone has thoroughly enjoyed playing 3D bingo as part of these lessons, in particularly the winning of a prize at the end.

SCIENCE— Science classes was made up of a very fun and interactive topic, Chemical Sciences. We completed a number of experiments, including mixing different materials in water such as salt and sugar, investigating the density of different mixtures and making an oil and water solution to create an 'Ocean in a Bottle'.

Art pieces using water and salt to represent the ocean that covers 70 percent of the earth's surface were created as part of this lesson, these turned out fantastic!

Finally, students learnt all about desalination, even designing their own desalination plant.

HASS— This term in HASS we have covered the topic of Economics. We studied the difference between a need and a want and had a go at budgeting. The class was broken into small groups and given a fixed income amount for the week. Students then discussed and agreed on how they would spend their income for the week ensuring their needs including shelter, food and bills were paid and considering ways they could save for their wants. It was such a fun activity enjoyed by all.

It has been such a wonderful time to join this Year 7 class! I could not have asked for a better group of students to enjoy this special time with. We finished up the year with an excursion to the Mandurah Foreshore and Cicerellos for lunch, a movie in the Lecture Theatre and Christmas Craft and Cooking.



ECO LEADERS

All students are involved with revegetation and conservation either directly or indirectly, through our Eco Leaders program. The Year 7's sorted tree loppings from the school garden which were used by the Year 10 Eco Leaders to cover sand blow outs.

In addition, all students contribute to the school tree growing nursery. Every class has a role to perform from sowing seed, transferring seedlings (pricking out) weeding, fertilising, transporting and finally planting.

To showcase this group effort, the Year 7's visited various locations around Mandurah, accompanied by the Eco Leaders who lead the excursion. They explained how the Eco Leaders operate and the skills they have acquired.

ENGLISH— Students have continued to thrive during their daily literacy lessons. During these lessons we have made emotional dice, completed NASA's DART and STEM projects as well as continuing to read the Tree House Story series as a group.

MATHS— Our Math focus has been on addition, subtraction and multiplication. We have undertaken games on Kahoot to support our learning, which involved single, team and whole class participation. Bingo, UNO & Maths challenges were undertaken, included games which incorporated keys, dice and cups. These challenges were completed under a timed scenario.



SCIENCE – We concentrated on sustainability during Term 4, planting, growing and maintaining our garden beds. We planted chillies, watermelons, pansies, tomatoes and snow peas. We monitored our classroom food scraps to feed our school chickens.



To complete our studies all the Year 8's attended SciTech on a school excursion, where the "Hot n Cold" Science show was a huge hit.

Throughout Term 4, the wonderful 8/9.1 students have continued to work hard to achieve their goals and nurture their relationships.

Everyone was excited to start the term with new Personal Interest Groups. Always a much anticipated and enjoyed learning experience, the students achieved plenty of success in these groups over both Terms 3 and 4.

ENGLISH - Documentaries and Docuseries have continued to be our English focus, specifically on the creation of documentary reviews, analysis and

investigating how they are made. We viewed a number of informative documentaries covering the topics of sustainability, climate change, food production, animals, movie-making and gaming and practiced writing mini summaries and reviews of each film.



MATHS - Students revisited number and developed their addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills. A range of learning tasks were provided where students were encouraged to take part in hands-on activities, work in ability-based groups to complete challenges as well as working independently, with staff support, to consolidate their learning.

SCIENCE – Students learnt about chemical reactions by conducting a range of experiments in pairs or small groups. They discussed their observations following an experiment,

providing reasoning for the failure or success of an experiment and identifying what a chemical reaction can look like i.e. bubble, temperature change, solid forming or fireworks!

HASS – In Term 4, the class was introduced to Australian Economics, specifically goods and services and what it means to be an informed consumer. They engaged in discussions about making effective and appropriate complaints to a business when they are sold something faulty, and how to recognise when their consumer rights are not being respected. They also investigated scams, learning about how to identify a scam and how to avoid one.

The Year 8's were lucky enough to visit SciTech this term! They absolutely loved the experience and we all enjoyed hearing the stories they had from their trip. The combined Halls Head College and Halls Head College ESC Sports Carnival was an extremely successful day, full of big wins and plenty of laughs.



This term and school year has been jam-packed, full of firsts and excellent progress from all members of the 8/9.1 group. We have experienced many ups and downs together, all of which have played a role in our learning journey and success. Each student in Year 8/9.1 should be extremely proud of their efforts and we congratulate them on their achievements this school year.

YEAR 8/9.2

Term 4 has been a busy one in Year 8/9.2! We have been working hard across all learning areas this term and have shown great progress in transitioning to independence in so many aspects of our school life. We are so proud of the hard-working, dedicated and enthusiastic students that we have in our class.

ENGLISH— As a whole class, we have viewed various documentaries over the semester, watching a suite of various genres and documentary styles. Each student worked towards summarising, rating, justifying, and discussing the themes and messages in these documentaries. Discussions were structured to support further understanding and higher-level thinking, allowing for rich critical and creative learning opportunities, all whilst building a vocabulary and having a platform to voice opinions in a safe space.



MATHS – This term we worked on consolidating and refining our number skills, with a focus on using a range of different strategies and improving fluency. A variety of learning tasks were provided where students were encouraged to take part in hands-on activities, work in groups to complete challenges and work independently to further develop problem-solving skills. Students worked together on a unit of maths called ‘Addition Detectives’ where their new addition strategies were implemented and helped them to crack the case. All students worked hard to solve the problems in front of them and used great teamwork skills whilst at it. Well done team!

SCIENCE– A major focus for Science this term was building inquiry skills and providing students the opportunity to decide on their own note taking style. Each student had their own device and was required to keep a simple, structured and formatted portfolio of notes. These notes were used as revision when consolidating their understanding on the states of matter and their properties. This tool was also utilised to capture their group work and hard copy evidence when hands-on tasks took place.

HASS– Students studied Business and Economics. Specifically, we focused on what a consumer is and how everybody has similar needs but different wants. They also learnt about the difference between goods and services, examples of these and what factors may alter peoples decisions. Everyone took part in having to make decisions from the perspective of a different person and gained a strong insight into the choices they may be faced with when they enter adulthood.

The Year 8’s were lucky enough to visit SciTech this term! We enjoyed looking at all the different displays and were fortunate enough to see a show. Everybody had a great day out with some being overcome from the excitement of the day and falling asleep on the bus!

This term and school year has been a fast-paced, exciting and enjoyable season of learning. We have shared some great memories, some light bulb moments, some quiet days but most of all shared in our passion for learning. Each student in Year 8/9.2 has been a credit to themselves and we could not be prouder of the fabulous term/year they have all had.
