



## **YEAR 7.1**

What a fantastic start to the 2023 school year! We are an all boy class who get along well, making for a positive classroom environment.

**ENGLISH**— Engaging in individual reading and spelling programs and learning how to write persuasive texts was our English focus this term. We learnt the difference between opinion and fact, and the correct structure to writing a persuasive text. Everyone worked hard on writing their own persuasive text, which was then presented to the class.

Typing lessons continued to be a classroom favourite. These lessons would start with each student logging into their account and following the typing program at their own pace. The program corrected their errors and reported their accuracy and speed. The aim of the typing program is to provide skills in writing an email, job application or reports and was undertaken three times a week for 15 minutes.



**MATHS**– The hands on activities from the school's Top Ten Maths numeracy program were a hit when learning about location and place values. We learnt how to rename numbers and used the MBA blocks to represent numbers. Three separate maths groups were formed during these lessons to assist students in their learning. Each group began the lesson by completing their mental math warm up books.

**HASS-** We learnt about Egypt and all the secrets it holds. We explored the mummification process and wrote names in hieroglyphics, learnt about pharaohs, pyramids, papyrus paper and sarcophagi. Classroom activities included mummifying a piece or apple and wrapping each other up in paper to look like mummies. All of these activities has seen students expand their vocabulary and knowledge.

To celebrate the end of term we will be watching a movie on the big screen in the HHC Lecture Theatre and, once finished, we will have a special lunch in the classroom.









## **YEAR 7.2**

Hello to all our wonderful parents and carers, we have had a great start to 2023 and I am super impressed by how well our Year 7's have transitioned to high school. **ENGLISH-** We learnt about persuasive text and identifying if something is opinion or factual. Students spent time writing their own persuasive text before presenting to the rest of the class.

MATHS- Mapping and location, rounding numbers to the nearest 10, establishing and identifying patterns, estimating collections and representing numbers using MAB blocks and place value were what we learnt about during maths this Term. All students are progressing well with their learning in this area.





The students have lots of exciting plans for the year ahead and all hands are on deck to ensure we are hitting our targets and kicking goals.












## PHYSICAL EDUCATION

## **YEAR 8/9.1**


#### **Miss Juliette Watts**

We have had an excellent and busy start to the school year. Each student has experienced new challenges and has taken on board everything there is to learn about being a year 8 or a year 9. It has been wonderful to see everyone getting to know each other and forming new friendships.

**ENGLISH**– Students explored advertising by investigating the techniques and strategies companies use to make you buy their products. We practiced creating our own advertisements and engaged in magazine scavenger hunts to find the most effective advertisements. Learning was showcased by designing and presenting a digital advertisement to the class.

**MATHS-** Throughout maths lessons this term we investigated place value, which gave students the opportunity to work with hands-on materials, number charts and game-based activities to further develop their understanding of numbers. Many continued to challenge themselves each week by working with bigger numbers

and nailed their understanding of how to split numbers into ones, tens, hundreds etc. We also started 'Financial Fridays' where we explored money skills, games, calculating change and shopping roleplay.



With an aim to build and maintain a positive and calm learning environment, students engaged in frequent mindfulness practices throughout the day. This included stacking blocks, wooden puzzles, colouring and sensory goo to calm and destress. Our whole class team loved these times in the day and looked forward to it, which was great to see.

This term we focussed on adding marbles to our marble jar. Students earned marbles when they engaged in positive behaviours with one other— for example excellent teamwork and supporting one another.

**ENGLISH–** The students focused on their persuasive skills, typing, and reading the Treehouse book series. They learnt how to effectively use persuasive language to make a compelling argument, through their Lego Car Projects. Additionally, they worked on improving their typing speed and accuracy, which is an essential skill in today's digital age. The Treehouse book series was a fun and engaging way to promote reading and develop their comprehension skills.

**MATHS–** We explored mapping, place value, and numbers. We learnt how to read and create different types of maps. Students also worked on their understanding of the place value of numbers, and practised their skills in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

**HASS-** We focused on job readiness and communities, as well as cultural understandings. The students explored different career pathways and jobs for the future. They also learnt about the different types of communities and the roles that individuals play within them. Additionally, they learnt all about cultural diversity and the importance of respecting and valuing different cultural perspectives.

Basic key words signs are a language that we have incorporated into our daily school routine. The students have begun learning how to sign greetings and names.

Overall, the Year 9 students have worked really hard and have made great progress in their learning and social development. ## SUSTAINABILTIY and T&E

It has been a very hot start to 2023, however we are extremely lucky to have an outdoor area and an airconditioned shed to continue our work in Sustainability and T&E.

Although most of the planting is done by the Eco Leaders. all the students contribute to the propagation and growing of the trees.

In the top photo you can see the Year 7's playing their part, filling the pots with soil and getting ready for the next step in the propagation process. It was pleasing to see the enthusiasm and interest shown by our new Year 7's and I am sure this will continue once the cooler weather arrives and we can commence the propagation and planting of our market garden.

The students were also very busy topping up the school garden beds with fresh soil. During this process they have been adding recycled carboard and organic matter such as sticks and grass cuttings to create soil that is nutritious and can hold water. In doing so we were able to create our own soil in a much cheaper and sustainable way.

This term we planted 90 seedlings ranging from lettuce, beetroot to chillies. In three months time we will be selling these vegetables and utilising them during cooking.

An excursion to the local tip proved to be an eye opening experience, with the students shocked by how much rubbish accumulates each week at the CleanAway processing site. All of what you see in the middle photo will go into a gigantic hole near Bunbury. It is too late for any of the recyclable you see within this photo. All recyclables need to go in the yellow bins, no one is going to pull-out metal, glass and steel now!

With this said we continued our recycling efforts during Term 1. They Year 7's have been doing their bit by collecting cans and loading up the trailer which will then be delivered to the Erskine Containers for Change depot by the Eco Leaders of Friday's.

**ENGLISH** – The Corporate Lunch during week 7 was a key highlight during our English learning this term. Each student was part of a working group with a specific focus. With collaboration between the catering team, logistical planning team and the design group - we prepared and served a very yummy lunch which was enjoyed by both students and staff. This provided a fantastic opportunity for us to showcase the work that the Year 10's do towards completing the Living Independently ASDAN program.

MATHS - Our main focus was learning about money and possible sources of income. This included learning about a variety of jobs, wages and salaries, Centrelink and more. Everyone worked hard to broaden their understanding and knowledge about the ways they can earn money as they enter adulthood.

**HEALTH** - 'Relationships' and how everybody's family and friend network can look very differently has been our focus during Health. Each student contributed their ideas in a mature and respectful way, making these lessons a great opportunity for rich discussions and mapping out ground rules for healthy relationships.

**ROAD AWARENESS -** Students worked towards recognising everyday signs, with a specific focus on social and safety signs around our school. The Year 10's learnt about basic passenger safety and what it means to be safe in a vehicle. This learning was supported be an incursion with the RAC during Week 8.

Each fortnight during Term 1 the Year 10's hold a whole year group meeting with staff and students. This meeting sees us pick two focus areas for the following fortnight. Students selected to focus on being prepared, being productive, getting along and resilience. ## **YEAR 10.2**

What a fantastic start to 2023!

The students have settled in well to Year 10 life. They have new subjects on their timetables and have transitioned well into the new expectations set on them as leaders of the school.

**ENGLISH –** This term saw us start our ASDAN portfolios, we accomplished this by discussing our likes and dislikes and sharing these with our peers, researching a famous person of our choice and practicing clear and appropriate communication with others.

MATHS - We started the 2023 school year by planning and organising a Corporate Day lunch. This saw the students practice and put in place their organisation skills, as well as counting the required equipment and budgeting for the catering and planning of the event. We also looked at location and mapping- investigating where our school is located within Mandurah. Australia and the world!



**HEALTH** - We built our 'Relationship tree' which is displayed in the classroom, this was done by brainstorming and then exploring the different types of relationships that we have in our lives from friendships, family and work colleagues. As the term progressed, we continued to identify the characteristics that make these relationships healthy and unhealthy and added these to our tree.

ROAD AWARENESS - Students prepared to start the Keys 4 Life Drivers Education Program by looking at safety in all aspects of road use- as a passenger, pedestrian and a driver.

WORK READINESS - The excitement is building in Year 10 as students are preparing for their WPL placements which will be starting in Term 2. They learnt about safety and hazards in the workplace and interview techniques as they prepared for their WPL interview with Mrs Lockley.

As a class we worked towards developing our five 'Keys for Success' from the 'You Can Do It!' Social Skills development

program, applied these at school and discussed how they can benefit us during Work Place Learning next term.









## **ART**

#### **Miss Jasmine Smith**

This term I had the pleasure of teaching Visual Art across all the year groups. It has been a delight to work with the children and discover their unique, artistic capabilities.

We worked with different art mediums such as watercolour, acrylic paint, oil pastels, clay and natural materials that we collected around the school. We explored traditional and contemporary art styles, including Indigenous art methods such as dot painting, paper bark etchings and experimented with line, colour and texture. While doing so we discussed the cultural context of Indigenous art and its significance to different people.

Year 7.1 leaf prints - The year 7's explored the colours and textures associated with the Noongar six seasons. They created some beautiful leaf prints using fallen leaves found around the school.

Year 8 Chinese dragons – To acknowledge the Chinese New Year in February, the year 8's researched the art and culture surrounding this celebration. They then used their knowledge to create their own Chinese Dragons, similar to the ones seen parading through the festivals.

Year 9 bark paintings - The year 9's explored the history and different techniques of Aboriginal Art. We discussed the importance of Indigenous art forms for communication and visual imagery to establish connections with ancestors and country. We recreated some elaborate bark paintings after researching real life examples and their use in Indigenous culture.

Year 10 exploring colour theory - The year 10's demonstrated their knowledge of colour theory in their unique self-portraits. First, they made portraits using one colour with a variety of shades. They chose a primary colour and made a full palette with that colour by adding varying amounts of white or black to alter the shade. They then made a monochromatic portrait using the same technique with only black and white.




## **SCIENCE**

#### Miss Jasmine Smith

Science this term has been extremely rewarding. Students have gained so much from the hands-on learning, and developed a real appreciation and love for Science. Across the year groups, we explored physical sciences, including force and motion, types of energy and how we can conserve energy and non-renewable resources.

Year 7: Forces and Gravity—exploring the force of buoyancy, the year 7's designed boats with aluminium foil which could demonstrate buoyancy and hold weight. They discovered that the most buoyant boat design was one that was fairly wide and had high walls. These boats were able to hold up to 41 pebbles!



electricity to flow through them (conductors) and materials that block electricity (insulators). They altered their circuits by replacing the copper wires with other materials that were either conductors or insulators.

Year 9: Heat Transfers - The year 9's collected data around the school to find out which materials absorb or don't absorb heat from the sun (thermal conductors). We achieved this by using a checklist to test the surface temperature of various materials around the school. We used our hands to feel the temperature of materials such as wooden benches, metal railings, limestone walls, and sand. From the data collected, we learnt that metal materials are the best conductors of heat. We used this information to justify the choice of materials used in playgrounds and buildings.
