## Year 7.1 with Mrs Halls

Term three in our year seven classroom has been wonderful! All the students are making great progress in all learning areas and we have really become a team.

The highlight of this term has been making models for the Mandurah Monuments and Memories History Project and designing and making our costumes for Literacy Week.

In English students have happily made, painted and decorated some fantastic costumes with the help of our very creative Education Assistant, Vicki Coles. So far, we have made a giant sorting hat for Shantell, a golden snitch for Cameron and Dobby the House Elf for Graham.

We have also worked on our skill in arguing, something that all teenagers want the upper-hand on in order to convince their parents that they are always, obviously right. Our students have written persuasive essays and have looked at ways in which the media convinces us to feel a certain way.

In Science this term, we have looked at forces and studied Sir Isaac Newton. The students made some fantastic parachutes in order to demonstrate air resistance. We explored friction and discovered reasons why we need to increase or reduce it in everyday life.

The students had fun playing marbles and investigating which ground provided the best amount of friction. Our experiment proved many of our hypotheses to be correct – too much friction and the marbles went CRAZY! Not enough friction and the marbles hardly moved.

For Maths this term, our class has been developing our mental maths skills. We saw a big improvement in scores for our mental maths quiz on Tuesdays and all the students have felt very proud of their efforts.

On Fridays, we explore chance and data. The students have gathered different statistics on favourite foods and represented this data in a bar graph.

Well done to all the year sevens from 7.1 for another great start to the semester!














In English students dedicated this semester to consolidating the skills they acquired in literacy last semester and developing new skills according to their individual needs. They are participating in regular reading comprehension exercises as well as spelling and grammar activities (including punctuation, and capitalisation in relation to proper nouns). Those students with severe literacy needs have been put on MultiLit, an intensive intervention program that has proven to be successful with these students. Teaching and learning for these students is augmented with Diana Rigg's literacy resources. For the majority of the students, they have expanded on their knowledge of the different forms of writing (informational writing, argumentative writing and persuasive writing) and are using regular writing events as an opportunity to demonstrate their growing confidence and skills in this learning area.



The theme of our Humanities program for this term is 'Indigenous Australians'. The contents being covered are providing our students with the opportunity to expand their understanding of the history of the Aboriginal and Torres Straits Islander people of Australia. The quality of work being produced by students under this theme has been very impressive.

Social skills instruction is one of the focus areas of our school and has continued to receive great instructional attention this term. It is taught across the curriculum (Cross-curricular) through role-plays, the

construction of social stories, provision of regular feedback, and goal setting. The process of goal setting involves students individually identifying areas they would like to work on and make them their goals for the week. The 'You Can Do It' keys including organisation, getting along, confidence, persistence and resilience are awarded to students who display behaviour represented by the keys.

### Year 8 with Mrs Enoma

The year 8 students have worked on the concept of skip counting, writing missing numbers and money skills as part of their maths program for this semester. They have responded positively to the concrete instructional approach employed. The students have also worked on a number of areas under the Statistics and Probability strand including, collecting data about favourite movies and plotting their information in Venn diagrams. Some students have enjoyed using our simulated classroom shopping corner. As part of our money skills activities, students visited the local Op Shops where they were exposed to a wide range of skills relevant to their participation in every day life, including choosing the right sizes and making payments.

This semester, students have been busy exploring phonics and learning their sight words in English. They have also had fun doing their creative journal writing and reading comprehension.

In Science, we have spent this term learning about insulators and conductors of electricity and heat. Students have also learnt about the different forms of energy and heat transfer such as conduction, convection and radiation. The topic generated a lot of curiosity and questions among the students as they investigated heat transfer in water. As part of this investigation, the students held a balloon filled with water above a flame and found to their uttermost amazement that the balloon did not pop as they expected! The explanation! – The water in the balloon absorbed the heat and stopped it from melting and popping for a reasonable length of time.
















All students have been busy little bees making and creating artworks, being inspired by Henri Matisse paper cut-outs.

Students in year 7 and 8 have developed paper cut-out designs using pre-painted paper as the French artist Henri Matisse did. Students have shown dedication to learning new skills in art when working with clay. They have made clay story tiles for the school Aboriginal Story circle, to adjoin to previous students artworks placed there from former years at Halls Head College Education Support Centre.

I particularly like Connor's attention to carefully carve out details in his tile. All year 7 students have used clay techniques like professionals. Our next project **Monster Mugs** will give students more opportunity to work with clay. They have begun designing their monster mugs.

Year 10 students have worked in groups to make box reproductions of local buildings. Their models were showcased at the Mandurah Milestones and Memories event which was held at the Fish Trap Theatre. Kaleisha, Jemma and Jackson made a reproduction of the Mandurah Performing Arts Centre, whilst Preston, Tarneika, Georgia and Adam worked steadily to make their box replica and artworks to go on it. A good effort by all students involved who put their personal touches on their models. Our supporting students attended the event. Student models from all contributing schools showcased crabs, bridges, churches, cottages and modern buildings.





During English lessons students have watched 'Behind the News'. Once a week students select one news segment and then state the topic, the issue and thesis (answer to the issue). They also represent examples to the answer from the segment, followed by giving their overall opinion. The students have shown great improvement with their visual comprehension as a result of this activity.

For numeracy and literacy week our class turned into wonderland as we became characters from Alice in Wonderland. When students from other classes entered our room they were treated to blue drinks that shrunk them and small cake biscuits that made them grow. If they were lucky they even got to meet the Mad Hatter and have a photo with him.

In Humanities we have been doing Aboriginal studies. We have been particularly focussing on the symbols and what they represent.


The Transportable classroom has become a home to Mr Werrett's group of Year 10 students. It has intentionally been set up to create an office or work atmosphere more than a traditional classroom, in keeping with the importance attached to Work Placements and Engagement with the Community in Year 10. In keeping in the theme, the Senior Room have focused on etiquette of answering the phone, interviewing and creating children's books in preparation for a visit to one of the local primary schools.

Mr Werrett's students have been busy this term learning about Australia's taxation system, developing personal monthly budgets using an Office Excel spreadsheet, working on a group project to build a model of a part of the Mandurah foreshore whilst also learning about the many changes which have impacted the urban landscape of Mandurah over the past 100 years. The Senior Room students have been engaged in activities that involve grouping according to common features, the basics of budgeting, shopping and entertaining.

Promotion of physical activity and education about a range of practical health issues have also featured strongly this term. Students have participated enthusiastically in a range of games and activities which foster both physical wellbeing, mental alertness and motor-skill co-ordination as a lifestyle, but also develop team skills and social interaction among students. Physical activities such as yoga, circuit exercises, kick cricket, bike riding, dodgeball, swimming, and volleyball have all been played so far.

### Cyberbullying

Childhood bullying used to be face-to-face physical and verbal behaviour in the playground, classroom and on the way to and from school. Now online technology and constant connectivity has allowed bullying to harm children through often anonymous contact or actions. Cyberbullying can happen at any time and can leave a child feeling unsafe and alone.

Cyberbullying commonly occurs through:

Comments posted in an open online environment such as Facebook.

Direct text, email or instant messages online or on a mobile phone.

Private features on social networking services such as Snapchat and Facebook Messenger.

Children can manage cyberbullying with your support by taking the following action:

**Blocking the Person** cyberbullying and changing privacy settings. Retaliating or responding to the perpetrator only gives them the attention and power they want.

**Reporting the bullying.** Most websites have online safety centres and reporting facilities. Online abuse is in violation of the Terms of Use of most social networking sites. The Office of the Children's eSafety Commission can take complains and provide assistance in retaliation to serious cyberbullying material that is directed at a particular child with the intention to seriously embarrass, harass, threaten or humiliate.

Collecting the evidence. Keeping mobile phone messages and printing emails or IM conversations.

Talking to someone they trust like parents or a teacher.

**Visiting iParent** for a list of sources of professional support including the Kids Helpline on 1800 55 1800 or parentline.

Taking the cyberbullying quiz. There is also a quiz for parents.
