Year 7/8A

MATHS

Towards the end of the term, students have been studying shapes. They've used toothpicks to create various 2D shapes. The students have also been continuing to enhance their shopping skills in preparation for the excursions to the shopping centres next term.



ENGLISH

Throughout the term, the Year 7 and 8A students have been working on a finger puppet play based on the story, "The Emperor's New Clothes." As the term draws to a conclusion, the students are just about ready to perform and film it. They have also been regularly visiting the school library, borrowing books that further develop their interests.



HISTORY

Continuing with the theme of celebration and tradition, the Year 7 and 8A students have been organising special events for the school. On March 17th, the students had a St Patrick's Day Parade when they carried a large pot of gold, wore leprechaun masks and Irish jigged around the school handing out "gold" to their fellow students.

SCIENCE

This term the students have been discovering the difference between living and non-living things. Through photos, they have been recording the living and non-living things that are around the school and been using them as activities in class. The students have also been documenting the growth stages of bacteria they've collected with a swab and contained in a petri dish. They have now completed their documentation of it by compiling weekly photos of their bacteria in a power point, which outline the changes from the beginning of this term to the end of this term.

Year 7/8B

ENGLISH

In English class we are reading interesting stories that are non-fiction. Griffen is reading a story about a baseball player from Japan named Ichiro Suzuki. Griffen finds it very interesting because it's about baseball. As part of English class we are writing many stories using our imaginations. A favourite story which students have written about is "What's in the brown paper bag?" !! Tahlia's story was about a china teacup with a golden dragon on it. On opening her brown paper bag she was thrilled to find a chocolate egg inside!





SCIENCE

In science class we have been growing plants which are living things. Our bean plants are growing big and strong. We have also being carrying out some fun experiments with colour – this has been one of our favourite activities so far.

MATHS

In Maths class we are learning about patterns. We are beginning to skip count and use basic operations to figure out number patterns.

COOKING

In cooking class we have celebrated two very special birthdays. We made cupcakes for Zac in our class and decorated them using a baker's piping bag. It was also Mr Barker's birthday and we helped Samantha in Year 8 to make him a special melon cake.



HISTORY

In history we are learning about different cultures. We recently painted an Aboriginal picture using similar techniques to those used by Indigenous people. We are going to continue learning about past history of other cultures to develop our own timeline.

Year 8A

MATHEMATICS

In maths, our students have been learning about money in real life situations through weekly shopping activities to Coles. Students' knowledge of money maths was reinforced with an excursion to the local museum this term during which they had a go at paying for their bus rides (to and back). They have also been learning about 3-dimensional shapes and telling time using the analogue clock and so on.







ENGLISH

Students have been engaging in various literacy activities such as newswriting, phonics, spelling and reading. Staff used games to make literacy instruction a lot of fun and students particularly enjoyed the game involving the blending of initial sounds to form various words.



HISTORY

The year 8 students have been busy undertaking a comparative study of technologies of the past and present. As part of this lesson, students went on an excursion to the Mandurah Museum where evidences of the old and new in relation to technology were displayed. The excursion to the museum was the climax as it provided students with invaluable opportunities to extend their perspectives on technology. Some found out to their amazement that technology has not always been about computers and android devices as they experimented with using the ink well and typewriters to write, as well as investigating other past technologies. They all had a great fun!

ECOLEADERS

The latter half of this term has been jam packed with activities as our intrepid EcoLeaders have been out in force in the community, working in close conjunction with the City of Mandurah on initiatives to keep our local areas clean and safe.



Our EcoLeaders also had the opportunity to participate in 'Keep Australia Beautiful' week.

Under the supervision of Mrs Hardy and her staff, they worked at the Len Howard Reserve, a valuable wetland stretching along the Estuary which is a nesting and breeding area for birds that visit from as far away as Russia.

Working in small teams and wearing the essential personal protective gear, they removed litter from the paths and boardwalks and then sorted the litter into categories to assist the council with their data collection studies.

Students, once again, have proved to be great ambassadors for our school, demonstrating fantastic team spirit, cooperation and work ethic.







On 11th March, students travelled down to Tims Thickett in Dawesville, a small bay which is particularly popular with campers and fishermen this time of year. With Salmon beginning to run for their annual migration north, the council are keen to keep the area clean and in good order.

Students were treated to an expedition type adventure that included a rough track with plenty of humps and bumps. When we arrived Jenna from the conservation team was waiting with gloves and bags. Students found that the biggest danger left by irresponsible beach goers were fires left to burn under the sand. In addition to the obvious danger of stepping on hot coals, bottles had been thrown into the fire making the situation worse. With plenty of care, gloves and scrapers, we picked up everything safely.

Meanwhile, back at the school students have continued to work hard planting seedlings and maintaining our wonderful ESC Garden areas. It's fantastic to watch our future Eco warriors stepping up to the plate and taking such a keen interest.

Year 9A


SCIENCE

Students have been learning about the different types of body systems. For this term, they have focused mainly on the human digestive system and covered some of the processes that break ingested food into forms that can be absorbed by the body.

Students were fascinated to learn about the roles of the different parts of the digestive system – where it all starts and where it all ends! They were amazed at how food makes its way through the body, as some of it is broken down to make nutrients and become our source of energy whilst the bits that our body doesn't need continue on their journey until they are eliminated! Students also learned about other areas related to food digestion such as food groups, balanced diet and healthy eating. Each student then made a model of the digestive system







SOCIALSKILLS

Students have been working on a range of social skills including cooperation, respect for each other, and learning to work together as a team member among others using a number of team-related activities. One of the team activities enjoyed by students this term is cooking. As a class, they researched different recipes, cooked different meals, complied with relevant hygienic procedures before and after cooking, observed table manners and cleaned up after cooking and eating. A few tips and reminders to students and parents:


- If a student is having difficulties or issues with their placement then it is vital that they discuss this with the WPL staff, Candyce Doorn and Georgina Fay.
