


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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I cannot speak highly enough of everyone involved in the planning and preparation which made this event such a success. It was fantastic to see so many parents and family members join us for the evening.

Explicit instruction, structured and sequential one-on-one teaching as well as visually-supported approaches were some the pathways used to deliver our **English/Literacy** program this semester. As usual, consideration was given to the individual characteristics of students in the design, implementation and evaluation of students' learning. Some of the skill areas that have been and are still being covered this semester include phonics and phonemes, grammar (punctuation), reading, spelling, speaking and listening.



Time (including reading time to the hour, half an hour, quarter and minute on both analogue and digital clocks) was one of the key areas targeted for instruction during the second half of this semester (Term 2) in **Mathematics**. The other was the physical measurements of two-dimensional and three-dimensional shapes within the classroom and around the school. In addition to the provision of learning opportunities in the above areas, ample opportunities were also provided for students to consolidate on some of the skill areas covered in Term One including addition and subtraction.



In **Humanities** the Year 7.1 teaching and learning program for Term Two focused on **Place and Liveability**. Under this topic, students explored and researched the factors that people consider when they make the choice of where to live. Some of these factors include environmental quality, proximity to services and facilities (e.g. hospitals, gyms, etc), availability of employment and schools, cultural identity (closeness to family members), safety from natural and human disasters and other lifestyle choices (including proximity to the beach).

Science is one of my students' favourite learning areas and for good reasons — it means having the opportunity to participate in experiments and practical demonstrations as well as be involved in the daily management practices and routines for our black leghorn hens. These include, feeding, provision of water, collection of eggs and so on.



It's hard to believe it's nearly the end of Term 2, the students settled in well after the April holidays and have been working hard creating a very happy room.

In **Mathematics** this term we are continuing with our mental maths. We set a timer at the beginning of each session and the students enjoy the challenge of seeing how much they can achieve in the set time frame. We have been measuring and estimating shapes and objects, practicing times tables and telling the time. We have also introduced the "Code-a-pillar" This is the beginning stage of robotics; the students can control the direction of the Code-a-pillar by rearranging the body parts to set different paths.

We start our **English** sessions with spelling, reading and sentence writing. For some students the word "sentence" is a scary one, so this is a work in progress. We are lucky enough to spend every Wednesday morning at the school library; the students have their own Library account. They are learning how to find a book or subject of interest on line and locate it within the Library; they can then borrow the book and spend time in class reading.

In **Science** this term we are looking at the classification of animals, our students are learning to identify and categorise different animals.

In Art this term we talked about Anzac Day, the students produced a beautiful piece of art relating to the sadness of war, which we proudly displayed on our class windows for the schools open night. (See our picture on the front page). We also learnt about the meaning of reconciliation week and what it means to all Australians. The students had fun doing a traditional aboriginal dot painting.


Year 8 with Ms Kaleas & Mr Barker

During Term two students have studied a variety of basic **Mathematics** skills, working independently on addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. They are becoming wizards at mental maths. Students are also learning about duration of time. They are doing a great job understanding this important concept which will give them the skills to manage and prioritise their time.

In **Science** this term, students have learned about living things. We are currently working on organelles of the cells and their functions. From there, students have learned how cells that do the same job combine together to form body tissue, such as muscle, skin, or bone tissue

and groups of different types of cells make up the organs in your body, such as your heart, liver, or lungs. A visit from **Critters Up Close** gave students the opportunity to see what happens when all of these combine to form animals. Everyone had great fun meeting many different types of animals up close and personal.

As part of our **Health & Well Being and Positive Behaviour Program** the girls have had a wonderful time being part of the 'Girls Club'. They have learned how to apply make-up, do nails, make all natural face masks and toners and have enjoyed conversations with girls from the Halls Head College Big Picture Program who are mentors in the classroom on Mondays. We will continue to work on hygiene, manners, clothing and learning how to be good friends. This club is fantastic!



During **English** this term, students have written fiction and non-fiction stories. They have used writing prompts to assist them with this. Some of the prompts used were: "Draw a picture of a character and write a story about it" and "Write a story about a memory that a particular smell brings back."

In **Humanities** this term, students have worked hard on their inventions. They had to come up with inventions that would make the lives of people easier. Students had to pitch their idea to the class and follow up by developing a prototype. Some of the ideas that students put forward were a regenerating arm and fashionable protective skate clothing.

Project Based Learning in Term Two has seen students design and develop their own projects. Some students created character suits and gaming/movie props, whilst others have decided to create movies.




The *Year 9 mathematics lessons* for the second half of this semester focused on enhancing students' understanding of measurement and number skills. The students participated in a number of activities involving the measurement of lengths and time. They also learned about prime and composite numbers and used hoops of different colours to sort numbers into both groups. This approach made what initially seemed to be a difficult concept fun and enjoyable for our students.

For the last few weeks of this term, our students have been focusing on spelling, phonics, reading comprehension and creative writing during their *English lessons*. The Students displayed their literacy competence in a variety of ways — while some employed puzzle pieces to learn their sight words, others enjoyed the challenge of writing their own imaginative stories (e.g. 'the Magic Ring') which they shared with the rest of the class.



The Year 9 students have been investigating different scientific concepts under the 'Chemical Sciences' strand. In one of our investigations, students were mesmerised to observe that when one cup (full of water) was connected to an empty cup with a tube made of tissue paper, water flowed through the tube until they both had the exact same water level (the concept of equilibrium). In demonstrating the concept of a 'chemical reaction', the students investigated the reaction between coca-cola and milk and found that new substances were created (chemical reaction) as compared to adding water to oil (no new substances were created – physical reaction).

Advice to help manage children's time online

A child's life is full of opportunities for them to spend time out of school with community groups, sporting clubs and their friends. Spending time online is also a regular activity for many children who enjoy communicating with friends, sharing information and playing games.

Whilst there are no guidelines for the 'right' amount of time someone should spend online or gaming, if your child is being negatively impacted by excessive use it may be time to discuss how they can take action to maintain a healthy balance. Australia's National Physical Activity and Sedentary Behaviour Guidelines tell us what health professionals recommend is appropriate for entertainment. You can read more about this on the eSafety website and download the infographic "8 tips to keep on top of your child's screen time".

Some tips to guide you in helping your child maintain a healthy balance between online and offline activities for the benefit of their health and wellbeing can be found on the eSafety website.

Look for indicators that your child may be spending too much time online, such as a declined interest in other activities, talking constantly about an online game or activity, a decline in grades, or irritability.

Discuss how other aspects of their life are being affected. Excessive use can impact on someone's health and wellbeing, family, relationships, work or education.

Consider establishing rules about when your child can play games or use the internet and how long they can play for. You might make a mutual agreement to set a balance of online and offline activities. You may need to establish consequences for rule breaches. Depending on the age of the child you may also set passwords that they do not know.

Locate the computer or device in a shared or visible place in the home so you know how much time your child is spending online and what they are doing online. Set limits at night and remove technology devices from bedrooms.

Seek support if you have concerns. Visit Parentline in your state to access help through counselling information and referral.


In **English** this term, students have attended the Library each week. They have chosen a selection of books and participated in shared reading. Students have explored "Book Creator" on the iPads as they created mini books. In preparation for WorkPlace Learning (WPL), they engaged in work ready activities that prepared them for interviews with the employers. All Year Tens have now commenced WorkPlace Learning and are demonstrating newly developed skills.

In **Mathematics** we have practiced number recognition and demonstrated an understanding of basic conventions of mathematics. This term, we have had presentations of information from both the Australian Taxation Education and Bendigo Bank. Students have explored the concept of work, income, banking and taxation. They have also dabbled in the basic concept of budgeting and purchasing items of need, as opposed to want.

The Business Enterprise students have been very busy and productive preparing for and conducting their very first stall just in time for Mothers Day. They sold a selection of items they had been making throughout the term in anticipation for the big day. It was a huge success, with students making pre-sales and selling most items. They were very happy with their first attempt and are now preparing for Fathers Day with new items. Alongside the stall, students have also been developing core work skills as they participate in the Coffee Cow enterprise. A selection of interested students have created order forms, taken orders, made coffee and delivered orders. They have counted money and performed a basic stock take.

During the term students have revised their knowledge and shared their understanding of the Keys to Success Programme, identifying each of the 5 keys, the values that are associated with them and exploring thought blockers and positive self-talk. Each week realistic goals are set and students practice and work towards achieving these throughout the week. Year Ten students have engaged in a combination of cooking and garden activities, each week alternating and sharing the load. They have worked on the basic etiquette of meal preparation and meal time manners.

During Semester two a selection of students will participate in the Keys for Life pre-driver education course, while others learn the core skills of road awareness and safety if not as drivers, as passengers. Mandurah Shire are launching the RYDE program that will aim to compliment the Keys for Life program and support young drivers.



PARENT EVENING

Our school held a Parent Open Evening on Tuesday 8th May. Thankyou to everyone who supported this event with over 70 parents and family members attending. Parents had the opportunity of seeing the different ESC areas and classrooms, meeting our staff and enjoying a light dinner. Congratulations to Mr Michael Jones who was the lucky winner of our fresh food raffle.



WorkPlace Learning

This term the Year 10 students commenced their Workplace Learning with various local employers. The students thoroughly enjoy themselves at work and are thriving in their placements. So far the feedback from businesses has been positive, with the students being complemented on their engagement, friendly attitude and being dressed appropriately.

Workplace Learning gives students the opportunity to learn new skills, they learn how to communicate appropriately in the workplace, work co-operatively with others and use workplace technology and equipment.

Students are visited regularly whilst out at their placements. We meet with employers to discuss the student's program and monitor their progress.



During these visits, photos are taken of the students completing various work tasks and communicating with their work colleagues. The students then get to share these photos during class time and discuss the types of work they have done each Tuesday.

It is very important that the students bring their logbook back to school each Wednesday so they can be checked during their career lessons. If parents/guardians can help with this, it is greatly appreciated.


On Monday 18th June the Leaders carried out their first official duties at our Term Two assembly and we are very proud of the wonderful job they did.
