It has been a busy start to the year with students having the opportunity to develop their reading, writing, speaking and listening skills in English and measurement, number and algebra in Maths. Students are working at their own levels according to their individual strengths and needs. Some students will be offered our intensive one on one literacy intervention program—MultiLit. Parents will be notified regarding this over the next few weeks.

'Life and Living' has been our Science topic, which includes the characteristics of living things, the conditions that are necessary for the germination of plants and seeds, measuring the growth of plants and participating in the routine management of our poultry.

Family is our theme in Humanities and Social Sciences (HASS). Students will learn about different types of families, personal milestones and timelines.

The year 7 students have set personal goals each week with each goal reflecting at least one of the five key areas of the 'You Can Do It' Program—Getting Along, Confidence, Organisation, Resilience and Persistence.

We are all looking forward to our excursion to Coles to practice purchasing skills and handling money, the Chinese New Year Parade and our end of Term Team Building day.









# Year 9.1 with Mrs Enoma

# Health with Mrs Hardy



Mrs Hardy will be teaching Health lessons across the school. Some of the topics she will cover with students are:

- *Protective Behaviours* Developing personal safety skills that can be used by children and young people to keep them safe at all times.
- *eSafety* The ever changing nature of the internet can pose challenges for students and parents. eSafety provides information and resources to help students develop the skills and knowledge to keep themselves safe online.

## Catastrophe Scale

As part of our **You Can Do It Social Skills Program** staff use the Catastrophe Scale (see picture on right) to help students to think about their problems. They talk about the different problems they face and how bad they really are. The images on the scale help students to put their problem into perspective.

eg. Most students can understand that a car accident is worse (more Catastrophic) than dropping your ice cream.



#### Supporting your child's safe use of online games and in-app purchases

If your child plays online games and uses apps it is important to use the games safely and understand how the costs can add up. Apps and online games provide great social interaction and entertainment but additional costs can be incurred even after you have already paid for the game.

For example, while playing the online game or using the app, your child may be given the option to pay again for extra content such as bonus game levels or points.

To help control the costs of online games and apps:

- **Turn off "in-app purchases"** in the settings of your phone and other devices so your child has to ask to buy additional levels/characters/lands
- **Keep passwords to yourself** so others can't purchase apps and add-ons without you knowing
- **Talk to your child about costs**. Explain that games, apps and the extra features in them all cost real money. Watch your child play a game or app and explain which parts cost extra.
- **Set a reasonable weekly or monthly spend** for apps or games and help your child track their spending so they can make good choices. For older kids talk about data costs as well.
- Check what your child is doing. Are the games and apps appropriate? Online games have ratings and some apps and games have inappropriate ads with links to adult websites, contain offensive material or replicate gambling games. Check out the multimedia review on the iParent section of the eSafety website. The eSafety website also has tips on how to protect your children from inappropriate content, including pornography, self-harm sites and violent videos and games.

Watch #GameOn, a video that follows the online experiences of a group of lower secondary students who find themselves in situations that catch them off-guard and teach them the consequence of making poor decisions.

For email or text messages, we need to know who you are, who your child is, an explanation for the absence and when we can expect your child back at school. Usually a brief explanation will suffice, although we may ask for more details if we feel it is necessary.

Absence should always be for a genuine reason. If we do not hear from you we will follow up your child's absence by contacting you. Please ensure that your contact numbers are always kept up to date. It is an important administration function keeping track of our students, and you can help assure us that our students are safe each day by promptly advising the school of any absences.

If you have any queries regarding your statement please contact the front office on 9581 0613.

Parents/guardians with eligible concession cards are able to apply for the Secondary Assistance Scheme (SAS) in 2019. To be eligible for the allowance the **parent/guardian** must hold one of the following cards, valid for a period of no less than 4 weeks.

- **Centrelink Family Health Care Card** card holder must be parent/guardian. Claims cannot be made by a parent using a student's card (ie: the student may hold a card for disability purposes)
- Centrelink Pensioner Concession Card Student name should be listed on the card
- Department of Veterans' Affairs Pensioner Concession Card

The allowance consists of two components:

\$115.00 Clothing allowance paid directly to the parent/guardian. \$235.00 Educational Program Allowance paid directly to the school.

Application is made by the parent or guardian for student/s enrolled in Years 7 - 10. Claim forms are available from the ESC Front office in the Administration block during first term 2019.
