### MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL Mrs Debbie Fieldwick

Term 1, 2019 has flown by and has almost come to an end already! We have seen a busy second half of Term 1 with many activities, excursions and an awesome term 1 assembly. The year nine students and the choir entertained a jam packed lecture theatre filled with students, staff and family members on Friday 29<sup>th</sup> March. As always, our student leaders did a fantastic job leading the assembly and all of our award winners were congratulated. We also announced the 2019 school leaders—see picture above. I congratulate our newly elected student leaders and I look forward to working closely with them. I would also like to give thanks again to our retiring student leaders. Our school community thanks you for your service.

Year 7 students have clearly settled into life at high school. It is great to see their enthusiasm for learning as presented in this newsletter. Our year 8 students have not wasted any time getting into school work, projects and excursions this term too. The year 9 students have been learning about democracy and the election process and they visited Parliament House. The year 9 students then used their knowledge to ensure we had a fair election process to vote in our new student leaders.

Year 10 have been out and about to their Work Place Learning interviews. We are very pleased with the way they have conducted themselves at their interviews and all students will be starting their work experience next term.

Our school is proud to have Sustainability as a school priority. Through the priority of Sustainability, our students develop the knowledge, skills, values and world views necessary to contribute to more sustainable patterns of living. There is a real sense of productivity around our sustainable practices here at our school. Our gardens are looking delightful with fresh food produce appearing in so many of our garden beds. Recycling and composting programs are happening and the chooks are laying eggs. Our year 10 Eco leaders are expanding our school's sustainable reach into the local community. Well done to everybody in our school and thanks to Mr. Dixon and all those involved in the Sustainability committee for pushing us forward in this area.

Finally I would like to remind everyone that the HHC ESC School Board AGM is to be held on Monday 27th May at 5.30pm in the HHC Administration building. We would love parents to put this date in their diary and come along when we present our 2018 annual school report and formally elect new members.







This term, in Science, students have learnt about the concepts of 'Living and non-living things' and have covered areas such as the characteristics of living things and the requirements for the growing of plants. Students have been put into groups and allocated plots to grow vegetables of their choice. The Year 7 students are rostered to the chook shed on Fridays and while there, they participate in various management activities including feeding and providing clean water for them. As you may have guessed, the most popular activity is the collection of eggs!

There has been no lack of enthusiasm among my students during *mathematics lessons* – their commitment and dedication have been inspiring! So far this term, students have focused on deepening their understanding of their sense of numbers with instruction focused on the addition, subtraction and multiplication of numbers, as well as reading time (measurement). While learning new skills, students are given time to practise in different contexts until they attain mastery. In recognition of its importance to students' life choices and chances, mathematics has been accorded special status in our current Business and Operational plans and thus commands an enormous amount of resources and Instructional time.

Ample opportunities have been provided to students this term to develop, consolidate or advance their social skills according to their individual needs. Some of the areas that we have worked on this term include team work, cooperation and showing respect at both individual and group/team interaction levels.

Students have made good progress working on their family themed project this term in History. (Humanities and Social Sciences—HASS). students have learnt among other things about different types of families and the role of members within a family. They have enjoyed using the 'Book Creator' app to write their report.

The evaluation conducted early in the school year demonstrated heterogeneity of ability among my Year 7 students. Thus, teaching and learning in English this term has embraced diversity in both content and instructional strategies towards meeting the individual learning characteristics and strengths of students. The goal has been to provide a balanced and student-centred literacy program and covering content areas such as reading comprehension, speaking and listening, spelling and writing. Every Thursday (subject to availability), students visit the library to borrow books of their interest and to return books borrowed previously.

# YEAR 7 TRANSITION

The majority of our new year 7 students have settled in to their new school and routine exceptionally well and are continuing to do so as the term progresses. New friendships have been formed and staff continue to support and offer strategies to the students who need the extra social skills to make friends and communicate with their peers in a positive manner.

As well as working in the classroom, the students have worked out in the garden and learnt about the use of Personal Protection Equipment (PPE). These skills have been put into practice when using the tools and machinery in maintaining the school grounds.

Students have also been very busy working on various projects in the shed with Mrs Coles and expressing their creativity with 'string art'. They had the opportunity to hammer nails into wood and create a masterpiece of the first letter of their name with string.

Well done to all of our year 7 students for the smooth transition from Primary School to High School, which we know can be very tricky and challenging .

In English this term, the Year 8.1 students completed reports that pointed out the harm plastic waste has caused to the environment. After being given the opportunity to research texts about this particular issue and to develop awareness and discover potential solutions, they created a message in the form of an art piece using plastic waste. These art pieces will be displayed at an art show which the students will run in Term Two.

Students also participated in regular creative writing lessons. During one of these sessions they developed a story in a similar vein to Chinese myths. Everyone had a great deal of fun doing this.

The class has worked on their understanding of odd and even numbers In Maths. They had a dice-throwing tournament, which helped them grasp the related maths facts. *This term we have used the online maths resource, Skoolbo which caters to the student's level and encourages independence. The students have stated that this is a fun way of learning maths.* 

Living and non-living things has been the main topic in Science this term. Year 8 students have looked into the characteristics of living things. This has led into an insect research project, where they studied an insect of their choice. The students also created their own insects, which they displayed on large paper craft toothbrush.

The class has enjoyed weekly gardening sessions with the aim of eventually growing strawberries.

**During the Social Skills lessons this year, Year 8 students have participated in the You Can Do It program.** Through this they learned about the Five Keys to Success and how to use them to achieve their weekly social goals. As well as following this program, students have role-played through situations that have bothered them. As the term has progressed, their confidence has grown to a point where they are now more comfortable to perform out their emotions in front of the class.

*In Humanities this term, students have immersed themselves in both local and international celebrations.* A blast was had by all who participated in the traditions of Chinese New Year. This 15-day celebration had students making Asian crafts and learning about the meanings behind the activities that happen during this event. To end Chinese New Year, we joined up with the Year 8.2 class and had a banquet that included delicious Asian dishes such as fried rice and spring rolls. This was followed up by performing a lion and dragon dance story.

St Patricks Day has been another celebration enjoyed by the class. Wearing green extroverted costumes and carrying around novelty floats that displayed photos of famous Irish people (e.g. U2, Gerard Butler, etc) students paraded around the school, eventually ending up in one of the Year 9 classes. There they Irish danced, handed out golden jelly and told Irish jokes.













Term 1 in Year 8 has been jam packed with fun activities and learning experiences!

In Science we have investigated the difference between physical and chemical reactions via various experiments such as making home-made lava lamps, churning our own butter, cooking scones, freezer bag ice-cream, slime, and even Mentos/ coke volcanoes!

We have also been hands on for PBL (Project Based Learning) making paddle boats out of recyclable materials. Library time each Friday is our favourite thing to do in English!

In Health and Wellbeing, we have been creative and trialled tie-dye shirts, basic first aid, and stress relief play dough. During Maths, students have worked on developing an essential life skill of using money to purchase everyday items, putting our knowledge to the test with an excursion to Coles supermarket. This linked in with HASS by purchasing items that we consumed during our Chinese New Year Feast! In order to appreciate our multicultural society and relationships with fellow countries, we researched traditions and practices followed during this special time of the year and made lanterns as well as stain glass symbols for good luck. The show stopper was a combined group performance when students made a dragon and lion costume from recycled materials.



# Year 9.1 with Mrs Enoma

The Year 9 students have been learning about government, democracy, election, citizenship and the roles of a good citizen during HASS. The class went on an excursion to Parliament House to consolidate their knowledge of the Australian political system. Students were excited to learn about the Legislative Assembly. Great job to the Year 9.1 team for successfully running the student leaders election for the 2019 school year.



This Term, the Year 9 mathematics lessons have focused on enhancing students' memory skills and their quick recall of number facts through regular practice of their multiplication tables and participation in other mental maths activities. Students have also learnt about finding the perimeter of different objects in the class-room as well as how to use a protractor to measure the sizes of various angles under the *Measurement and Geometry* outcomes. Under the *Number and Algebra* strand, some students used the magnetic numbers to count one to one correspondence.

In English, students have enjoyed reading, comprehension, language convention and writing activities. Various forms of writing such as persuasive, recounting and creative story writing have been undertaken. While some students have concentrated on punctuating, proof reading and editing their own work, others have worked on their handwriting skills.





Our class has had such a wonderful start to the year with us all contributing to make our room a great place to be. Our new couch is so relaxing—we use it to do our daily reading.

The plants we have in the room make it feel as though we are in a jungle. Graham and Shantell think the best thing about our class is we are all happy.

Joseph said that he has learnt to regroup and can add bigger numbers.

Harley is really excited about using calculators to make life easier.

Mrs Baker and Mrs Turner have learnt how to dig holes and use screwdrivers.

Mr Dixon has learnt how to use the electro board.



As we start the 2019 school year, with the use of high interest project-based activities we are building confident life long learners. At various times throughout the week students take part in a selection of activities including gardening, cooking, sewing, craft and coffee making. Students have been learning important skills associated with promoting and producing items to sell for their business enterprises. This year, students in year 10 have several business enterprises running, including the Steam Coffee where they provide a perfectly brewed coffee for staff. This business involves students creating order forms, taking customer orders, making and delivering products.

Other business enterprises include Student Office and Craft. Each enterprise involves students learning the skills of advertising, stock take, taking money, budgeting for replenishing stock and collating a running total of expenditures. Outside of the general management of such a business, students also need to learn the skills of actually making the product for sale.

While students are enjoying the opportunity to explore learning through fun hands on activities, they are also engaging in continuing to build core skills of English, Maths and Social Skills as they practice reading individually and in small groups, working mathematically practicing concepts of number, time and money, and developing skills of managing their own feelings through the exploration of the Zones of Regulation. Students have also engaged in weekly Yogacize as they regulate their Health and Wellbeing.

To date, the Year 10's are settling in to the new working environment and are preparing for workplace learning to commence in term two. They have been learning all about personal safety in the home and work place and identifying **SAM** (**S**pot the hazard, **A**ssess the risk, **M**ake the change).





This is an exciting time for our Year 10 students as next term will see the start of Workplace Learning. The students are currently preparing for work by completing the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) requirements and attending interviews at prospective work places. These have been nerve-wracking experiences but as always the students have shown great enthusiasm and communication skills. They are excited for Workplace Learning and are very keen to get started.

Students completed their Talents and Interests work pack in Term 4 last year and with the information gathered from the Year 9 parent information session last year it has given the school a guide which we have used to find suitable placements for the Year 10 students this year. Workplace Learning provides an invaluable opportunity for students to develop the many skills they need for employment. In previous years this has led to both employment and traineeships.

A few tips and reminders to students and parents:

- WPL will be on every Wednesday from 1<sup>st</sup> May through to 25<sup>th</sup> September 2019
- If a student is having difficulties or issues with their placement, then it is vital that they discuss this with the SWPL Support Officer Georgina Fay.
- Mobile phones are to be on silent or turned off and left in bags whilst students are at work.
- When late or not attending please ensure a phone call is made both to the school (9581 0613) and the workplace (WPL supervisors name and contact details are in the student logbook).
- Logbooks need to be filled in each day by the students and returned to school the next day.
- Ensure students have had a reasonable amount of sleep the night before.

It is very important that the students bring back their logbook every week so if parents/carers can help with this it will be greatly appreciated. ### Managing Sexting

Sexting is the sending of provocative or sexual photos, images, messages or videos using a mobile phone, via email or posting online. Young people often consider sexting as a way of connecting in a relationship. Support your child's safe online experience by considering the following:

- Think about the legal ramifications. If anyone in the photo (naked or semi-naked) is under 18 they may be committing a crime. Viewing it or sending it to others may also be a crime.
- **Report it**. If the image/video is online, you may then contact the webmaster and ask them to remove it.
- Seek help. Ask the school to help track who might have the image and where it might be posted. Ask them to provide support to your child and others involved as the negative impacts of sexting can affect grades and behaviour.
- Be reasonable about consequences. Sexting is not uncommon behaviour and your child is not alone in being negatively impacted. Rather than adding to the distress, implement clear consequences for your child instead. For example, by limiting phone and internet use.
- Friends are critical. Help them stay connected to friends online and offline for support. Other trusted adults can also check your child's wellbeing and help them manage peer reactions.
