# YEAR 7

### **Dr Stephen Enoma**

### **English**

This term, the Year 7 students have been working on different English/literacy activities towards the achievement of their individual learning goals for Semester Two. At a whole class level, students have also focused on developing their skills in the act of reading for understanding (also known as reading

comprehension).

The reading comprehen-

sion process commences with students selecting texts at varying levels of difficulty determined by prior assessments, followed by their working through the relevant stages of reading comprehension (including the "See-Think-Wonder" strategy, making connections, predicting, questioning, monitoring, summarizing and visualizing) and

concluding with a whole-class presentation (which forms part of their speaking and listening assessments).



Similar to the above, students have been engaged in individualised activities in mathematics according to their levels of competence. While some have been working on consolidating

their one-to-one correspondence skills, adding single-digit numbers and skip-counting increasing by 2, 3, 5 and 10, others have been working on their money mathematics skills, developing an understanding of the concepts of "odd" and "even" numbers as well as "Chance and Probability" -related activities amongst other areas.








### **Humanities and Social Sciences (HASS)**

The theme of our study in HASS for this term is "Indigenous Australians". Under this topic, the Year 7 students have learnt about the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, with a particular focus on cultural symbols (such as the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags) and the messages they convey.















# **YEAR 8/9.1**

### **English**

In English this term, the students got a chance to create narratives and poems (raps) through various fun activities. These activities included Story Cube Dice, Predictive Text (on the iPad), OSMO English games, and One Word Stories. Students can now use these activities to help them develop stories in the future.

The students enjoyed the Predictive Text activity the most. The stories that the students have written have since been adapted into other media forms (e.g. Movies, Audio Narratives, Comic/Picture Books, etc), and some amazing created pieces have been made as a result of all these activities.





This term, students participated in Literacy and Numeracy Week. Through the term, our class has been reading and watching the Australian series, "Tomorrow When the War Began". This plot focusses on a group of high school students in the middle of an invasion of Australia, in particular how the characters' cope in traumatic situations.

These students dressed up as characters from the story and set a dramatic scene (as taken from the story) that visitors to the classroom had to role-play through. It was a great deal of fun and I'm incredibly proud of both the staff and students for pulling it off.



### Maths

In Maths this term, the students have played fun skill building maths games such as Finska, Uno, Jenga, etc. They have also utilised online programs such as Mathletics and Skoolbo. OSMO maths activities such as the measure game "PIZZA" has also been enjoyed by the students.







### **Social Skills**

In Social Skills this term, students continued to follow the 'You Can Do It' (YCDI) program. They have set goals which will help them develop the necessary life skills required to succeed.

Students have been involved in some life skills situations, through team building, role play games and life orientation situations such as cooking, where they have had the opportunity to practise using these skills.





# **YEAR 8/9.2**




### **English**

This term, the Year 8.2/9.2 students have been engaged in report writing, creative writing, reading comprehension and sight words as part of their English program.

Additionally, they have had opportunities to expand their vocabulary to boost individual student's confidence in public speaking skills.









### Science

The students learnt about the concepts of 'light' and 'shadow' in Science this term. Under both topics, they enjoyed investigating various materials that are transparent, translucent and opaque.

The results of their investigations revealed to them that transparent materials let light pass through them in straight lines, so that you can see clearly through them. While translucent materials let some light through, but scatter the light in different directions. They also discovered that opaque materials do not let any light pass through them.







### Maths

Division, multiplication, money skills and the place value of numbers has kept the Year 8.2/9.2 busy during Mathematics this term. Students have also learnt about various topics under the *Statistics and Probability* strand.

These include learning how to conduct chance experiments, Venn diagrams, using skittles to collect data and produce a pie chart to represent the data, administering surveys to collect data from staff and students (e.g. favourite takeaway food) and summarizing the information gathered into appropriate graphs.

# **YEAR 10.1**

### **Mr Graeme Dixon**

### English

Students have continued general Literacy practice through daily Literacy sessions, engaging in a selection of activities that focus on reading, writing and communication. Students work on individually adjusted work tasks, including Multi-Lit, Phonic awareness and reading the nutritional information on food products, identifying specific details.

### Maths

Throughout this term, students have researched Taxation and the bands of deduction, mobile phone plans and identifying the best and most cost effective for their personal use. Students have also taken part in math concepts of adding using alternative fun methods.













### **Keys for Life**

This term students were divided into two groups, one preparing for Keys for Life pre-driver education and the other engaging in Road Awareness. During Keys for Life, students have studied the road rules and engaged in hands on activities that draw focus to distractions and road safety and well as the road signs.



### Health

During Health students were engaged in Protective Behaviours, identifying the differences between themselves and others as well as public and private. Katie and Harley have shown that they understand the importance the circle concept which outlines protective personal space. Some students have begun researching other aspects of health, looking at contraception and the laws of relationships and young people.



# **YEAR 10.2**

### **English**

In English this Term, the year 10's have looked at using their writing and reading skills for filling in forms. We have looked at a number of forms including job applications, medical forms and TAFE forms. Our students have also used their research skills to plan events, such as a trip to 'Grilld' finding information on the opening times, menu and prices.

### Maths

For Maths, students in 10.2 have been shopping in 'Miss Fieldwick's General Store', a classroom shop used for practicing the skills of calculating the total of items and the change. We have also looked at graphing, and did a fun activity graphing the colours of 'MnM's!







# **ECO LEADERS**

This term, Mr Dixon and the Year 10 Eco Leader students and staff gathered together at Marlee Park in Parklands to plant trees.

Our student and school vision is to have a tree planted for every school child in Mandurah in an effort to offset our community carbon footprint and to plant a forest for the future. Mr Dixon and our Eco Leader students are working in partnership with the City of Mandurah to get this project off the ground.

On Friday, 28 August 2020, the Mandurah Mayor, Rhys Williams and Deputy Mayor Caroline Knight joined students in planting seedlings. Students worked and planted alongside school staff, community volunteers, former parents and students as well as some school board members.

In the Simulated Workplace Learning program, the Students have been busy in their chosen industry areas following direction from their Supervisors.

Our industries include Office, where two of our students, Kyron and Montana have been busy laminating, shredding and preparing resources for classrooms. They also make sure the stationary and paper supplies are delivered to the various offices and classrooms.

Students, Kassi and Korbin have been busy making Aprons for the Business Enterprise students. They have been learning to sew using the sewing machine, cutting material to the correct measurement and following their supervisor's instructions to sew the various pieces of material together.

The Cricut design team members, Graham and Joseph learnt to use an app called Design Space and together with the Cricut machine, they produced name stickers to attach to drink bottles for all the Year 10 Workplace Learning Students. Later, accompanied by the leadership support of Eithan, the team designed a coffee cup logo in Design Space and then embellished the design onto the aprons made by the Sewing team.

Lee and Harley have been busy car washing and detailing, which has kept them extremely busy due to the high demand in orders from our staff and mainstream staff who all enjoyed the great service.

Byron has been busy supporting Mr Wilton in Health and Physical Education classes, encouraging younger students in sport participation, helping set up the equipment and helping students with their writing in Health.
