This term Cyberbullying – Tips on how to best support your child online. Cyberbullying commonly occurs through:

- Comments posted in an open online environment such as Facebook
- Direct text, email or instant messages online or on a mobile phone
- Private features on social networking services such as Snapchat and Facebook Messenger



Children can manage cyberbullying with your support by taking the following action:

Blocking the Person cyberbullying and changing privacy settings. Retaliating or responding to the perpetrator only gives them the attention and power they want.

Reporting the bullying. Most websites have online safety centres and reporting facilities. Online abuse is in violation of the Terms of Use of most social networking sites. The Office of the Children's eSafety Commission can take complaints and provide assistance in retaliation to serious cyberbullying material that is directed at a particular child with the intention to seriously embarrass, harass, threaten or humiliate.

Collecting the evidence. Keeping mobile phone messages and printing emails or IM conversations.

Talking to someone they trust like parents or a teacher.

Visiting iParent for a list of sources of professional support including the Kids Helpline on 1800 55 1800 or parentline.

Taking the cyberbullying quiz. There is also a quiz for parents.

YEAR 7

English

The Year 7 English instruction for Term 4 was aimed at achieving a balanced curriculum. It consisted of grammar, reading, viewing, writing, speaking and listening, and targeted at supporting students individually to meet their literacy needs.

It covered some essential aspects of grammar including the parts of speech, the provision of regular opportunities to practise their spelling and the rules of capitalisation in relation to their uses while writing proper nouns and at the beginning of sentences.







Maths

The Mathematics curriculum for this term focused on the consolidation of mathematical skills. This included the reinforcement of students' comprehension of number concepts and the application of number operations flexibly in different contexts.

The addition and multiplication of numbers and their cumulative, associative and distributive properties were amongst the content areas covered.



Science: The *Earth and Space* strand was the focus of teaching and learning in Science this term. Under this strand, students learned about space and made their own models of the solar system. They also learned about the various uses of soil and water including serving as a habitat for soil fauna, the holding and release of nutrients for plants, and hydroelectricity, transport, recreation/sports amongst others respectively.









YEAR 8/9.1

In English we continued reading as a class the series Tomorrow When The War Began, where we discussed issues that closely relate to the students.

The students also worked on visual comprehension that leads on to creative writing. Some of the students are very proud of the stories they have created in this task.

We also saw some of the students complete their Multilit sight words, which is a huge achievement.







Maths

All the students in the class have achieved success with their math assessments this term. It has been very pleasing to see each student progress in a positive manner.



YEAR 8/9.1

Science

In science this term the students conducted chemical experiments including making slime and Oobleck. The students enjoyed getting their

hands messy all in the name of science.













To develop team building skills the students went on a whole school excursion to Homestead for Youth. There they participated in fun farm activities, such as animal handling, bush craft decoration, pony care, and tractor riding.

YEAR 8 & 9.2

Maths


This term, the Year 8 and 9 students have played various mathematical games as part of our hands-on learning to enhance their multiplication, subtraction, addition and division skills in a fun and relaxed atmosphere.

The students also learned how to collect information and plot their findings in bar graphs and Venn diagrams. Other areas covered in mathematics this semester included adding and subtracting fractions while other students also engaged in hands-on shopping activities where they added items on shopping lists and calculated the change required.

English

The Year 8/9 students have been busy this semester exploring a wide range of texts as they developed the relevant skills to becoming intentional, purposeful and active readers. Some students analysed newspaper articles.

The students have worked on employing metacognitive strategies in their reading activities and over time have individually improved on their reading fluency and comprehension.







The four reading roles strategies (Freebody & Luke 1990) came handy for these students as they employed skills relevant to the meaning maker, code breaker, text user and text critic to enhance their comprehension of various texts.

Students had many opportunities to practise creative writing punctuation, spelling and participated in phonics activities.

YEAR 8 & 9.2

Science

These young scientists have studied earthquakes and why they occur. They made a model of a seismograph, an instrument used to measure the magnitude of an earthquake.

They also learned about the three stresses on rocks (e.g. compression - rocks move together, tension – rocks move away from each other and shearing – rocks slide past each other).

To make the learning meaningful for the students, we used biscuits and shaving cream to demonstrate these three types of movement.

















YEAR 10



With another successful year, it was time to wrap up ASDAN. Student work files, along with their evidence portfolios went to Perth to be moderated and came back with glowing feedback.






Students have put in a tremendous amount of work and deserve the praise to go with it. Congratulations to you all.




Information Morning Tea
