

YEAR 7.1

Term 3, can you believe it! We are continuing to have a great time in 7.1 with one another.

ENGLISH- This term has seen us continue to work on individualised reading and spelling programs targeted to each students needs. We have worked through a reading series and the correlated workbook/spelling book. The class has continued progressing through their typing program three times a week to enhance their typing skills. Everyone has increased their speed and accuracy levels which will help in the future with technology.

We have then used these new skills to plan, draft, compose and edit an informal report on a country in Asia. Using the classroom laptops, they have been persistently working on their project, researching their chosen country and typing up their papers. Visual were then created to support their reports, including PowerPoint, maps, drawings and props.



MATHS- Time has been our focus during Term 3. We have learned the units of time including how many minutes are in an hour, how many hours are in a day and how many days are in a week and year. Some even learned how many years are in a decade and a century! The class thoroughly enjoyed the hands on activities while we learned about time. They were requested to wear a watch to help better management of their own time and be able to answer what time it is at any point in time during the day. I was very impressed with their abilities when it came to time.

SCIENCE— We have been learning about the classification of animals. We researched amphibians, reptiles, birds, mammals and fish, learning how to classify animals into their correct group. Secondly, we can define what is a producer, consumer and decomposer. Students worked hard finding these items around the school and built up a solid understanding of these terms. Finally, we learned about food chains and food webs in a variety of ways. Discussing predators and prey was a very exciting way to learn about the lifecycle. Everyone created their own poster to show their own food chain.

HASS- This Semester we have focused on Geography, the environmental resources and water in the world. Liveability was a big focus and what factors may influence where we live. We researched water scarcity in the world and how we can overcome it by using more renewable resources and water saving tips. Students understand the process of how water gets to their taps. The class compared renewable and non-renewable energy sources and how they impact our environment. We focused on solar, wind and water energy, looking more in-depth at the energy sources available.

We have enjoyed having Nina the therapy dog visit our room this Term. She is always full of excitement and love. Nina has enough kisses for everyone in the room and likes to show off her skills!



This Term the 7.1 class began a new positive reinforcement incentive program. Students are earning keys according to the You Can Do It Curriculum for organization, resilience, getting along, persistence and



confidence. One key is randomly pulled at the end of the day and the winner gets to choose from a prize box. The prize box consists of Lego, kinetic sand, Play-Doh, slime, fidgets, and toys. Students can be rewarded a choice from the fun stationary prize box at any point in time during the day, which has been a fun addition to the classroom as well. Students have responded very positively to the new reward system taking their good behaviour to the next level of independence.

YEAR 7.2

I joined this fantastic class at the beginning of the term and we are already getting close to the finish. The children have welcomed me and have been working hard well to their own individual level.

ENGLISH - Each student has been working hard on their individualised AAC, phonics, reading and spelling programs targeted to their needs. It has been great to see everyone's confidence grow as a result of taking part in this program daily. We have also been reading, writing and following recipes to make some tasty meals.

All have participated in the making – listening to instructions, taking turns, measuring and mixing. This term has we began using Book

Creator on the classroom lpads, this encourages typing and learning new skills while we are

writing and presenting an informational report on Asia.

MATHS - This term in Maths we have focussed on time. This has ranged from learning to look at and understand visual timetables, learning how to read both analogue and digital clocks to the minute. We have practiced the days of the week and months of the year to assist in the understanding of time. It is great to see students checking the time themselves to find out which lesson comes next during the day.

SCIENCE— We have learnt the meaning of vertebrate and invertebrate and then classified vertebrates into the groups amphibians, reptiles, birds, mammals and fish depending on their characteristics.

HASS- Geography has been our HASS focus, in particular the environmental resources available and water in the world. We have compared non-renewable and renewable resources and the effect of continuing to use non-renewable resources to power our world. We have also looked water and how the lack of water impacts our lives. Students have looked at how water gets to our taps in Western Australia learning how we source water from the ground and the ocean. We also learnt how

scientists have been treating our wastewater and injecting it back into the groundwater so that it can be safely reused in the future. We continued our Geography lessons by studying what makes a place liveable. Focussing on weather, environment, price, education and closeness to family, realising that everyone has different priorities when deciding where to live. We studied food webs and food chains in a variety of ways. Linking herbivores, carnivores and omnivores to their love of dinosaurs, has helped students understand how food webs and chains work in a non threatening manner.

Term 3 has been extremely busy, with Literacy and Numeracy week and Swimming Lessons. Swimming lessons challenged and tired everyone out, however everyone who attended was very proud of their achievements.

As part of our focus on life skills and getting along, cooking sessions have provided valuable lessons in nutrition and making good food choices, as well as team building with everyone helping to cook and clean up. Some have tried activities they have been reluctant to participate in previously and actually enjoyed them, which is pleasing to see.







ECO LEADERS

This term the Eco Leaders were faced with a challenge. They found themselves stabilising an enormous sand dune located near Falcon boat ramp. The area is well used by families, but unfortunately, irresponsible vehicle owners drive over the vegetation and it is being destroyed. Once the vegetation cover has disappeared

> from over the sand, the dune is exposed and becomes eroded by the wind.

> Sand dunes are essential for protecting our coastlines and infrastructure from destructive winds, waves and storms. One of the many tasks undertaken by the Eco Leaders on Fridays was to restore and rebuild this important sand dune. Students used tree

branches from our school garden and worked hard to drag them up the slope and onto the exposed sand to help the dune to start its recovery. Well done team!

HEALTH AND SPORT

HEALTH- As we progressed through Term 3, the students continued to work on protective behaviours and the right to feel safe, specifically focusing on building and maintaining healthy and safe relationships and understanding bullying. A second focus during Term 3 was on puberty and the different changes we go through from a baby to an adult. Activities included brainstorms, interactive activities, classroom movement activities and solving scenarios. Resources such as the Daniel Morcombe Foundation, for protective behaviour lessons, have also been used to assist in their learning.





SPORT- If running away to avoid the rain or dodging heavy showers was a sport, then all our students would be experts after a very wet Term 3. For our Year 7, 8 and 9 students the focus (when the weather permitted) was on the traditional winter sports of Football and Soccer. Everyone had the opportunity to develop their handball and kicking skills, plus gain a better understanding of the rules associated with these sports. Our Year 10's have been working on fitness and attended the school's gym to work on their cardiovascular endurance and muscular strength. These sessions included gym etiquette, safety and correct technique. The Year 10's have engaged in a variety of activities that included using free and cable weights in addition to working out using treadmills, elliptical trainers and spin bikes.


The Year 8s have had an amazing Term Three. They have shown tremendous growth in all subject areas.

ENGLISH– The Year 8s have continued working on individualised reading and spelling programs in line with their abilities. They participate in daily reading and comprehension activities to both improve and consolidate their skills. Everyone has enjoyed learning about various topics, including animals, objects and constructions, through researching and writing up their informational reports.

MATHS—Our Math focus has been on time, in particular how to read both digital and analogue clocks. Students really enjoyed the hands on learning activities which related to time. I've been very impressed with their abilities and their enthusiasm to learn and develop this skill.

SCIENCE – In Term Three, students studied Human Biology. We have been learning about the digestive system. Although gross at times, the experience has been enjoyable

and fun, including seeing the journey of food through the body and creating fake excrements.



We were all very excited in the lead up to Literacy and Numeracy Week. Everyone worked extremely hard on their costumes for the Literacy parade. Our Literacy focus this term has seen us reading the Treehouse book series. Students are extremely engaged in this series, so far we have read three of its novels as a class.

The Year 8 class this term have been a wonderful bunch of students, enthusiastic in learning both academically and socially.













YEAR 8/9.1

This term, the students have worked amazingly as a classroom team and have continued to build their relationships with one another and experienced success in their learning. We have been able to achieve our goal of 100 marbles in the marble jar, which meant the students earnt a pizza party. We also began our personal interest groups, where each student participated in an activity for two periods per week that they have an interest in such as art, bike riding, self-care or music.

ENGLISH - This Term we have studied documentaries, specifically a documentary film called 2040 which includes themes of sustainability, urban farming, climate change and the environment. They also had the opportunity to explore a documentary of their own choice and research how to break down what they were watching and analyse it to find key themes.



MATHS - This term our class has been working in both small math groups as well as a whole class to learn about time. We have studied 24-hour time and time zones around the world. Some have

focussed on learning to tell the time on both analogue and digital clocks, whilst others have created timetables using bus and train times to plan a trip up to Perth.

SCIENCE – This term in Science, students have experienced scientific learning surrounding the life cycles of various animals, plants and humans. They have investigated how to categorise both living and non-living organisms and have learnt what living organisms require to say alive. We planted our own sunflowers, and enjoyed watching their progress as they grow.

HASS – HASS this term has been integrated with the our English focus. We have been investigating green energy and how we can power our houses and schools using solar panels

and wind turbines. The 8/9's have also learnt about the meaning of food security and what kinds of

issues countries can face if they do not have enough nutritious and healthy food for their population, which has encouraged us to think about not wasting food and even how to grow our own food.



Our class has also been working towards developing our social skills, specifically how to get others' attention in a way that is appropriate. We have been conducting role-play sessions and discussing real-world examples where this skill is necessary, which the students are picking up quickly.

This term has been a wonderful one, full of a lot of exciting experiences. Students enjoyed celebrating their hard work in earning 100 marbles with a pizza party and shared this

experience with the other year 8/9 classroom.



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YEAR 8/9.2

Term Three in Year 8/9.2 has been a busy whirlwind of learning, fun experiences, and growth! As a class, we have worked hard to develop a strong routine, with each student independently taking it upon themselves to maintain structure and own their own journey. As a team - Miss Timms, Miss Breen, Mrs Hughes, Mr Stokeld and Mrs Lawrence are all extremely proud of the organised, confident, and mature Year 8/9 students we have!

ENGLISH & HASS - This term, English & HASS have been integrated in alignment with the focus on 'Sustainability' and documentaries. Our learning has been centred around looking to the future – specifically, the year 2040. As a class, we have brainstormed, discussed, and watched videos that have given

us a glimpse into what our lives might look like, feel like and sound like in 18 years. Students created a '2040' mood board to reflect their vision for what that year will look like. It was incredible to see how different each imagines the world to be!

MATHS – We have worked hard this term to develop our skills and understanding of time, length, capacity, and mass. each unit of work, was brought back to the functional aspects of their learning journey. For example, students practiced reading clocks, creating, and reading schedules and applying their measurement skills in a range of scenarios and contexts. It has been fantastic to see everyone using these skills not only during maths lessons but also throughout their school days.

SCIENCE- During Science this term, students have been working with the fabulous Ms Lee looking at Biological Sciences – specifically, cells, organisms, life cycles and systems. All have enjoyed a wide range of hands-on activities, discussions and talking points as part of their learning.





Everyone in 8/9.2 has thoroughly enjoyed the Personal Interest Groups (PIG) this term where they were able to mingle with their peers from other classes, work with different staff and most importantly – immerse themselves in activities and learning experiences that are aligned with their individual interests!


YEAR 10.1
