# Makyry June - July

The Noongar Season 'Makuru' is represented by the colour dark blue as it symbolises rain and cold weather.

Makuru sees the coldest and wettest time of the year in the South West.

Traditionally, this was a good time of the year to move back inland from the coast as the winds turned to the west and south bringing the cold weather, rains and occasionally snow on the peaks of the Stirling and Porongurup Ranges.

As the waterways and catchments started to fill, people were able to move about their country with ease and their food sources changed from the sea, estuarine and lake foods to those of the land, in particular the grazing animals such as the kangaroo.

As well as a food source, animals provided people with many other things. For example, the 'yongar' or kangaroo, not only provided meat but also 'bookas' (animal skin cloaks that were used as the nights became much cooler). Nothing was left. Even the bones and sinews were used in the manufacturing of bookas and for affixing barbs to hunting tools such as spears.

Makuru is also a time for a lot of animals to be pairing up in preparation for breeding in the coming season. If you look carefully, you might see pairs of 'wardongs' (ravens) flying together.

Upon the lakes and rivers of the South West, you'll also start to see a large influx of the Black Swan or 'Mali' as they too prepare to nest and breed.

Flowers that will start to emerge include the blues and purples of the blueberry lily (Dianella revoluta) and the purple flags (Patersonia occidentalis).

As the season comes to a close, you should also start to notice the white flowers of the weeping peppermint (Agonis flexuosa) as the blues start to make way for the white and cream flowers of Djilba.

During Term 1, the Year 10 students completed their interviews for Workplace Learning (WPL) and were super excited when they were told they had got the job!

The students represented themselves and our school in a respectable manner, which helped them to secure work placements in the community. WPL allows students the opportunity to learn new skills, which include being polite and respectful to others, appropriate communication in the workplace, along with promoting their confidence and independence whilst learning real life experiences.

The students commenced WPL at the start of this term and are visited regularly whilst out at their placements. This allows for a check-in with students and the workplace supervisors to monitor students' progress. During these visits, photos are taken of the students completing various work tasks, students share these photos during WPL reflection time at school and discuss the types of tasks they have completed each week.

All Year 10's keep a record of their WPL by way of a weekly logbook. It is very important that these logbooks are brought back to school each Thursday, so they can be checked during their WPL reflection lesson. It would be greatly appreciated if parents/guardians can help support with this.

# Year 7.1

#### Mrs Leah Booher

The 7.1 class has had a fantastic first semester, making new friends and developing routines.


**English** - Narrative/imaginative texts and the correct structure to create a text was our English focus in Term 2. Using their creative minds to answer different questions, students used these imaginative answers to write their own narrative stories and produce a circularrama. Using a template, students wrote storylines, coloured backgrounds and then developed and typed up short stories. Stories were presented to their fellow classmates with a short oral presentation.



Maths - We focused on the topic of time and measurement. We learnt and developed an

understanding on the units of time; including how many minutes are in an hour, how many hours are in a day and how many days in a week and year through hands on learning activities. This included everyone wearing a watch to help them keep better management of their own time, and to be able to answer what time it is during the day. I was very impressed with their abilities. We also used different tools to measure things around the classroom and school environment. Students used balance scales to compare the mass of different objects and compared capacity of different containers.

**HASS** – Students studied Civics and Citizenship regarding the three levels of government within Australia. We learnt what each section of government controls and funds.



**STEM**– This learning area is a classroom favourite, as it allows for lots of hands on learning and problem solving. Each week students would partake in weekly problem solving activities, both independently and in groups. These included boats being built from foil with the aim being to hold

weight without sinking or filling with water. It was exciting to see whose boat could hold the most dice (weight). Following Term 1's HASS focus on ancient Egypt, the class built a version of an ancient Egyptian water lifting device called a shaduf. The competition continued when the students were challenged to see who could build the strongest bridge using newspaper! The bridge which held the most number of books, was deemed the winner. There was a lot of fun during STEM this past semester!

Following on from our lessons on local government and what it provides for the community, we went on an excursion to walk the art trail along the Mandurah Foreshore. We took with us a checklist to identify how many things/services we saw that the local, state and federal government has provided for Mandurah. We caught public transport, followed maps, and bought lunch at Cicerello's! It was a great day, with lost of smiles and laughs!









### Year 7.2

Hello to all the wonderful parents and carers of Class 7.2. I can't believe we are at the end of Term 2 and report time has come. Your children are well and truly high school students now and they are doing absolutely amazing.

English - Narrative/imaginative texts and their correct structure was our English for Term 2. They used their creative minds to answer different questions with the goal being to develop their own character. This character was then sent on marvellous adventures, as the students created a story with the aid of a story map. Everyone has thoroughly enjoyed reading comic strips during class and answer questions about the story before creating our very own comic.

Maths - This term we have focused on time and measurement. Students learnt and practiced using both the analog and digital units of time, along with converting time and calculating elapsed time. Using a variety of informal and formal measurement tools, we measured length, mass and capacity. Everyone particularly enjoyed applying their skills to measure and weigh different ingredients to bake biscuits.

**HASS** – In HASS, we have learnt about the three levels of government in Australia; local, state and federal. We studied what each level of government is responsible for and what Mandurah has to offer. When learning about the election process, the students developed their own promotional pamphlets, outlining facts about themselves, things they are interested in and what they could personally offer to others in the way of personal strengths. This was a great hands-on activity which everyone thoroughly enjoyed.

This Term we went on an excursion to the Perth Museum to visit the Ancient Egypt Exhibition. This excursion was an extension on our HASS learning in Term 1. It was great to test our knowledge of Ancient Egypt and to see up close what we learnt about.

All of or students in Year 7.2 have been working hard towards earning YCDI keys. They have all demonstrated an improved ability to get along, persist during challenges and use manners every day. It has been a fabulous first half of the school year, with very exciting things planned for the second half.

Students began planting in week 6 this term, in the hope we would have some follow up rain. Well, we got what we wanted with 20mm falling over the long weekend. Students were able to put in 300 Ficinia nodosa in a very short time. TEAMWORK! I was very pleased to see students take particular care where they planted. It didn't take them long to work out the bottoms of the dunes were the best place to plant, due to water run off and moisture in the soil.

Dune plants like to be planted a lot deeper than regular plants. It gives the roots a chance to stay cool during the hot months and the sand around the shrub supports the branches during windy conditions. In preparation for planting, we have been busy spreading branches along the coastline to reduce erosion and removing beach debris. The students have all worked well as a team and have eagerly participated in activities. During the next few weeks, we will be delivering plants to the City of Mandurah for the National Tree Day give away. We have had another busy term in Year 8! It has been pleasing to see how much maturity the students are now displaying as they continue to practise the 5 Keys for Success – Resilience, Persistence, Organisation, Confidence and Getting Along.

**English**– The Curriculum required us to study a novel. We chose "Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone" and we listened to the whole book from Audible as read by Stephen Fry. He kept us all interested and amused with the voices he made for each character. We then watched the whole movie in the Lecture Theatre, before beginning a project on character reviews.

Maths- Our focus has been identifying money, counting back change and being shoppers and shopkeepers. We made a class shop and have been taking turns in the shop. This included budgeting, planning and paying for items, with both the shopkeeper and the customer counting back the change for accuracy. In Week 8, we took the bus to the shopping centre and put in practice what we had learnt in class, by shopping at The Reject Shop.

**HASS**- We continued to learn about the levels of government, how laws are made and how they are enforced. In Week 10, we are going on excursion to the Old Gaol in Mandurah to learn about laws that were used when Mandurah was first settled, and where the prisoners were kept. We are also going to go to the Council Chambers to see where the Mayor works.

**STEM**– We issued a challenge where everyone was given an apple and a piece of pastry and they had to prepare a pie. Later, we listened to Harry Potter under the tree with the students all eating their pies. In another STEM challenge, we looked at the history of gourds, then the students were asked to go outside and find materials that could make a container that holds water. It had to hold water for longer than 5 seconds for the challenge to be met.

In **T & E** the students have made bird-hides to provide shelter and safety to small birds around our school.

16 students across Year's 8 and 9 have signed up for The Premier's Reading Challenge. You have to read 12 books before September to be entered for the major prizes, but reading a book each week gets the students entered into the weekly prize draw. # Systainability & T&E

The vegetable gardens have been extra productive this term, with all students taking home bundles of spinach and lettuce.

After viewing a YouTube clip on making soil, all were keen to copy the process by using recycled cardboard and organic matter to retain moisture and nutrients.

We are on our way to closing the loop on recycling, as ground litter from the chooks and food scraps are used to feed the worms. The worms then produce a highly nutritious fertilizer that is used on the vegies.

As a result, we have not needed to purchase any soil or fertiliser for the school this term. It has been fantastic to see the students repurposing products that would normally go to waste and contributing to our sustainability focus and mindset.

Our waste recycling and auditing systems are working well, with all classrooms taking part in sorting and storing. Each week students collect recycling boxes from each class and sort into cardboard, plastic, metal and glass.

Each fortnight, yellow wheely bins are left out on the verge. The process has become a valuable lesson in sustainability. It is made very apparent what leaves the school and the amount of waste we can recover. Students are seeing firsthand how much plastic is used for wrapping and becoming conscious of what goes to landfill.

Our latest project is the development of a native garden along the fence line near the highway. Once established, it will provide a little more screening from the noisy road and a place where small groups can sit. We are hoping to attract more wildlife and

install a watering point for birds. During the project so far, we have only broken one retic pipe and one shovel handle. Although this allowed for new learning activities to take place!

To celebrate students hard work this term, we will be holding another Corporate Day Lunch! Everyone has been working hard in class to do the catering and events planning for the


day, both individually and

#### **Mrs Eleanor Hemsley**


This Term, students in year 7, 8 and 9 have been enjoying some very hands on experiments and experiences in Science.

### Japanese

Minasan Konnichiwa! (Hello everyone!)

It's been a great pleasure to share my passion for Japanese language and culture with the students at HHC-ESC over the past two terms.

In Japanese this term, students worked to consolidate some basic vocabulary, grammar and formulaic expressions enabling them to participate in games and activities in the target language. We learned to count to ten, basic colours, classroom greetings, writing our names in Katakana, writing of numbers in Kanji and food vocabulary and how to express likes and dislikes related to food.

In addition, through engaging in a broad range of Japanese cultural experiences, students have been able to notice and reflect on the ways in which all languages manifest culturally significant attitudes and behaviours.

We brought Japan to the classroom through engaging in an eclectic variety of authentic cultural experiences, including:

- Shibori Japanese 'tie dye'
- Dressing up in traditional costume (Yukata)
- Furoshiki learning about the Japanese practice of using colourful fabric squares to wrap presents (in preference to using paper) or to form carry bags for things. This is in line with our school's commitment to teaching students about sustainability practices and lifestyles.
- How to use chopsticks (ohashi) and about Japanese table manners.
- Cooking some simple Japanese food.
- How to bow correctly and about how bowing is a ritualised display of respect.
